### Systems Qualification And Support Organization Formed

A new department has been formed to bring together all home-office Software Quality and Support activities into a single organization within the Business Group's Systems Development Division.

According to Bob Miller, senior vice president of the Business Group, the new Systems Qualification and Support department reports to Software Development Director John Scanlon, who is also acting manager for the new department.

"This organization will provide a single point of home office accountability for all software related quality issues," stated Bob. "This is critical from a broad perspective in early resolution of any software problems and also internally in creating the proper emphasis for design quality and rapid problem resolution."

There will be three areas within the new department:

*Systems Support* is a new function combining separate activities previously performed in the Information Systems, General Systems and System Development Divisions. Peter Steinbach has been named manager of Systems Support which will be responsible for Systems and the Small Business Systems section at Research Triangle Park.

*Software Quality Assurance*, under Manager Tom Morgan, continues in its mission of Quality Assurance Test Development and Software Product Qualification.

*Support Services*, under Manager Linda Skinner, includes Customer Services, Release Support, Westboro STR Processing, and Field Technical Communications.

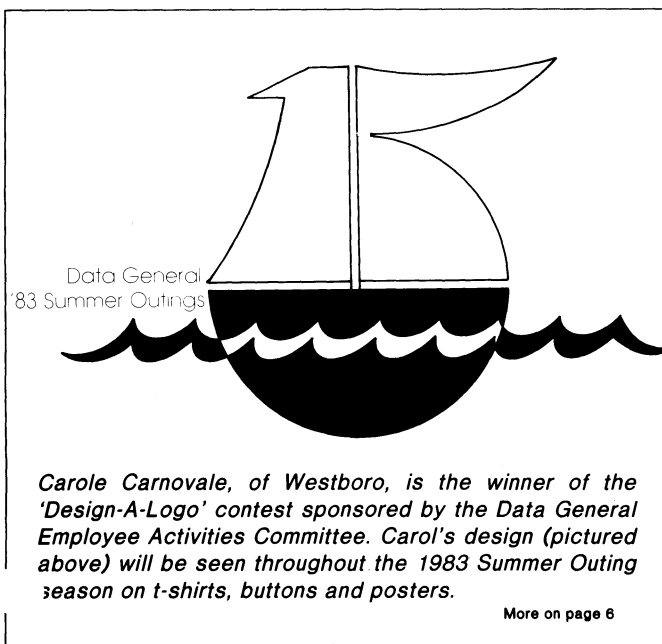
Peter Steinbach has most recently been manager of Information Systems Division (ISD) Systems Engineering. He was previously a manager in Corporate Systems Engineering and International Marketing. Peter joined Data General in 1974.

### Field Engineering Excellence Recognized

The fourth Annual Excellent Service Awards Conference - "The Pursuit of Excellence" - held earlier this month in Orlando, Florida recognized 122 outstanding field engineers in North America, including 29 repeat winners from the past three years. In addition to this recognition, several awards were presented at the four-day event.

Jack Beal, branch manager in Albuquerque, New Mexico (Area 3), and Federal Field Marketing Manager Dan Wiseman, formerly Albuquerque branch manager, share the banner award given for the highest customer satisfaction levels achieved by a branch during 1982. Other branch nominees were: Kansas City, Missouri in Area 4; Raleigh, North Carolina in Area 2; and Worcester, Massachusetts in Area 1.

In addition, two regional managers were recognized for the two regions with the highest levels of customer satisfaction during 1982. Herb Haslam, Area 3, Region 3 manager in Santa Ana, California and Don Headley, Area 2, Region 1 manager in Norcross, Georgia were singled out for their efforts.

"All of you have made the personal commitment to pursue excellence and are setting an example within our division and within the corporation," said Bill Bentley. "Your efforts have given Data General Field Engineering a strategic position of influence in the industry."

Other speakers included Data General President Ed de Castro; Frank Silkman, senior vice president of Worldwide Field Engineering; Frank Keaney, vice president of North American Sales; European Technical Director Wagn Pedersen; Tony Nicoletti, vice president of Field Engineering Support Services; and Fred Cochrane, vice president of Field Engineering's Engineering Services.

"What's important is that we take our individual ideas of 'The Pursuit of Excellence' and carry them into the future, that we continue to apply them to our responsibilities every day," said Frank Silkman. "Field Engineering gives Data General one of the most powerful levers we have to keep our customers buying our products."

## **Savings Program Captures Employee Interest**

Data General's newest employee benefit, the Data General Savings and Investment Program, has created a high level of interest across the company, according to Don Bateman, vice president of Human Resources.

"Reports from all locations indicated that employees like the benefit and that the meetings, printed material and Personnel staff are providing the answers they need," said Don.

The Savings and Investment Program allows employees to save from 1 to 10 percent of their pay

before it is subject to federal, social security and in most cases, state taxes. This means that the actual "cost" of savings is less than the amount saved. Earnings on the savings are also exempt from current taxes. The savings and earnings are not taxed until the money is withdrawn, perhaps at retirement when taxes might be lower, and then may also be subject to favorable tax treatment.

Between the time that money is put into the Savings and Investment Program and eventually withdrawn, employees may withdraw funds needed to meet financial hardships or take loans.

"Programs such as ours are relatively new," said Don. "But, we have attempted to take all reasonable circumstances into account to allow the employee to participate while still being protected in the event of financial emergency."

### **Investments**

Investments in the Savings and Investment Program are into any one or combination of three funds. A Guaranteed Income Fund guarantees principal and return. The return for 1983 is 12.5%.

The Balanced Fund and The Investors Funds are provided through Putnam Management Company, and as all mutual funds, do involve risks, but also the potential for higher return.

### **Last Week**

Next week (*Friday, February 25*) is the last week for employees to enroll in the program if they wish to participate beginning with the first paycheck of April. After that, enrollment will only be allowed at the beginning of each calendar quarter (July, October, January, April).

All employee meetings have been completed in Southboro and Milford. In both locations, employees with any questions may contact their Personnel representatives. In Milford, Personnel representatives are also collecting enrollment forms. While in Southboro, employees may submit enrollment forms to their supervisor.

In Westboro, meetings were scheduled to end today. However, make-up sessions have been scheduled for those who have not yet attended. The sessions are: Tuesday, February 22 at 9 a.m. and Wednesday, February 23 at 2 p.m.

Both meetings will be in the Marketing Training Classrooms in the lower level of Building 14B.

## **Open Enrollment Continues Through February 25**

The 1983 Data General benefits open enrollment period is underway. All employees must fill out a medical (HMO) benefits card, even if you do not

select any new benefits. Submit completed cards and forms to your supervisor or Personnel representative no later than Friday, February 25.

Employees in need of further assistance should contact their Personnel representatives.

## Investing In The Future

## SPSA Services Enhanced

Data General's Software Services group has announced increased rates and expanded services for its Software Products Service Agreement (SPSA), a comprehensive support package for users of Data General software.

The SPSA rates and increases vary according to the combination of software product and level of service. The overall average increase is 22 percent.

Enhancements to service under the SPSA include a monthly report on the customer's use of the toll-free telephone support service as well as a microcode subscription service for users with 32-bit computer systems.

In addition, the group introduced a plan to permit users to extend SPSA service to multiple operating systems at a reduced rate. Previously separate service agreements were required for each operating system. The plan is intended for users of the Real-time Disc Operating System (DOS) and the Interactive COBOL Operating System (ICOS).

"This is the only SPSA rate increase since our group was formed two years ago," says Jim Raisio, Software Services manager.

"In that time, Data General has worked to expand the scope and quality of service provided to our growing number of customers. The new rates reflect the increased costs of providing that service.

"Similarly, we have structured our SPSA to accommodate the needs of our users who have the RDOS-family operating systems," Jim added.

"This family of software, RDOS, DOS and ICOS, typically run on smaller systems," Jim explains. "Users are generally OEMs who maintain and sell multiple systems or end users who own several systems. Because these software products are basically so similar, we have found we can optimize our service for them and reduce costs."

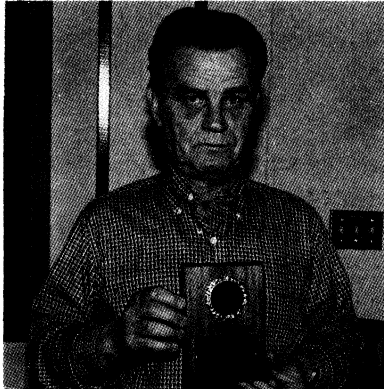

Maintenance Supervisor Pete Peterson displays his plaque.



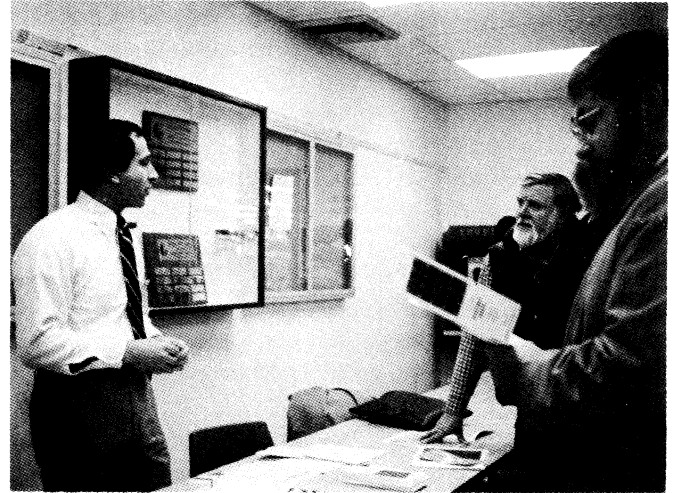

### Southboro Employees Attend Enrollment Meetings

Dave recently solved a problem occurring in both Manufacturing and Product Repair Center facilities involving interface connector pins on fixtures used with logic testers and terminal repair stations. The pins would come loose from their housing and recede into the fixture when it was attached to the tester. These failures were not always apparent, causing a significant loss of test time and an increase in equipment down time for diagnosis and repair.

Going beyond his normal responsibilities, Dave came up with the idea of designing a printed circuit board that could be soldered to the connector pins

on the outside of the connector, preventing the pins from receding when attached to the test station. The idea was quickly implemented on equipment used in the Milford and Colorado Springs Product Repair Centers and in overseas locations.
