Vice President Named For U.S. Manufacturing Operations

James Williamson has been appointed vice president of U.S. Manufacturing Operations for Data General, reporting to Dave Chapman, senior vice president of Manufacturing.

Jim will be responsible for all plant operations in the United States. Reporting to him are Ben Dalton, general manager of Southern Manufacturing Operations, Westbrook Plant Manager Carroll Halva, Portsmouth Plant Manager John Clary and Southboro Plant Manager Dave Foran.

Jim was most recently vice president, operations, for the Computer Division of Atari, Inc. at Sunnyvale, California. Prior to 1981, he filled a series of executive positions with the Diablo Systems, Memory Products division of Xerox, EMI Medical, Harris Corporation, and The Telex Corporation. From 1964 through 1971, Jim was with RCA Computer Systems.

The new officer is a graduate of Indiana Institute of Technology, where he received his bachelor's degree in electrical engineering.

Second Industrial Automation Center Opens

An Industrial Automation Center featuring the company's newest computer and graphics equipment for automated drafting, engineering, manufacturing and testing has been opened at the Sunnyvale Semiconductor Division. Data General's wide range of hardware, third party software and graphics products will be demonstrated within the 1,500 square foot facility. The center is the second of its kind. A similar facility is located in Westboro's Guest Marketing area.

"This center is indicative of Data General's commitment to the technical engineering community," says Technical Products Business Unit Marketing Manager Dave Rome. "It gives customers, and software suppliers a forum to inspect our products and try out their applications. It will be the principle way end users will select solutions for industrial automation. According to *Dataquest*, today's industrial automation market is about \$1.5 billion annually; but by 1987, the figure is expected to exceed more than \$6 billion."

Systems in the new center include:

- DESKTOP GENERATION computers, Data General's new family of desktop computers.
- ECLIPSE MV/10000 computer, for computer-aided engineering, technical timesharing and real-time computational applications.
- GW/4000 Expert Workstation, the high-performance, high-resolution graphics system based on the ECLIPSE MV/4000 computer.
- DASHER G500 medium-resolution graphics display terminals.

- AOS/VS Graphics Kernal System (GKS)

In addition, selected Independent Software Vendor (ISV) offerings will be featured to demonstrate Data General's complete 'solutions-oriented' systems approach to the CAE/CAD/CAM marketplace.

"This center will allow technical professionals to see one of the widest ranges of industrial automation tools in the industry today," Dave adds. "And allow them to tailor complete hardware and software solutions for their specific needs."

Several more Industrial Automation Centers are planned, with sites now being selected.

Data General Signs New Independent Software Vendors

The Technical Products Business Unit has signed new independent software vendor (ISV) agreements with five software developers to provide computer-aided-design, manufacturing and engineering programs for Data General's ECLIPSE MV/family computers.

The new additions to Data General's current ISV offerings are MSC/NASTRAN by MacNeil-Schwendler, PDA/PATRAN-G by PDA Engineering, GT/STRUDL by the Georgia Institute of Technology, SMIDS and CAMS by Construction Systems Associates, Inc., and Power Technology's PSS/E system.

According to Technical Products Business Unit Marketing Manager Dave Rome, "The signing of these agreements continues to point out the company's commitment to having the broadest possible line of quality applications programs available to our customers. They represent a stated corporate objective to build market share in industrial automation.

All packages are fully compatible with all models in the ECLIPSE MV/family.

Seminar Provides Foundation For Safer Material Handling

About 40 Southboro employees recently learned the proper way to use forklift and pallet jack equipment at a four hour seminar conducted in conjunction with the Central Massachusetts Chapter of the National Safety Council.

Discussed during the seminar were the proper way to balance materials, capacity and the distribution of weight on forklifts. These vehicles are used for shipping and receiving a wide variety of items including metal components, parts of computer systems and literature.

The seminar attendees learned that forklifts are designed with three suspension points which create a "stability triangle." Because of this they must be loaded and driven with care. Proceeding with caution up and down ramps and when turning corners assures the safety of operators and their materials.

In addition, maintenance issues were covered. "Maintenance is a very basic part of safety and prevention is the key word here. Fixing things as needed and making sure brakes, horns and lights are all functional is just one way of insuring the safety of an area," says Site Safety Engineer Kevin Mulcahy who helped to coordinate the course along with Materials Section Manager Stan Skarbek and Safety Committee Chairperson Ken Lowry.

On hand at the seminar were the Council's Executive Director and a material handling specialist. Kevin explains that it is important to keep employees up to date on all job related safety topics. "One way of providing timely information is to tap into available resources such as the Safety Council," says Kevin.

Before the course was scheduled Kevin and Stan gave a tour of the Southboro warehousing area to both visiting council members. Kevin notes, "They were very impressed with the equipment on hand and Data General's dedication to workplace safety."

At the end of the session each employee was given a written exam. Everyone passed and has received a certificate from the National Safety Council signifying successful completion of the course. "Programs like this help expand employee job knowledge while encouraging greater safety awareness for themselves and fellow employees," states Kevin.

Data General Scholarship Test Dates Coming Up

Do you have a child who will be graduating from high school in 1985? Does this child plan to enter college after graduation? If the answer to both of these questions is "yes", two upcoming dates may be important to you. On October 18 or October 22, 1983, each high school throughout the country will be administering the PSAT (Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test).

Any student applying for a Data General Scholarship must take the PSAT during his or her junior year of high school. If your child will be graduating in 1985 and wishes to compete for a Data General Scholarship, the student should contact his or her guidance counselor as soon as possible after school opens to register for the PSAT this October.

Data General awards six scholarships each year with the actual presentation made during the student's senior year of high school. Applications and brochures outlining the Data General Scholarship Awards program will be available from the Benefits and Personnel departments after September 6.

Savings & Investment Program Quarterly Changes Due

September 16 is an important date for those employees actively participating or eligible to participate in the Data General Savings and Investment Program. September 16 is the deadline for submitting all new enrollments and changes to the Benefits section of the Personnel department.

To be eligible to participate, you must have completed 90 days of employment with Data General by October 1.

By completing the Savings and Investment Program enrollment form, you can:

1. Elect to save a portion of your pay, if you are not already doing so; or
2. Change the percentage of your pay you wish to set aside each pay period commencing October 1; or
3. Change the investment elections for future savings deductions. You may elect to have earnings saved on and after October 1 directed to the Balanced Fund, Equity Fund or Guaranteed Income Fund -- or a combination of these funds.

All earnings you elect to set aside each pay period are on a pre-tax basis -- one of the many advantages of this program. If you are not now saving a portion of your earnings (up to 10 percent) or fail to submit an enrollment form by September 16, you will be unable to enroll at the beginning of the next calendar quarter (January 1).
