It's Getting Closer...

If you have not already done so, mark your calendars for October 10. That is the day Data General will kick off the start of fiscal 1988 with an open house in Westboro. All employees and their families are invited to attend. This is the first time an open house has ever been held of the Westboro facilities.

On that day, employees and their guests will be able to tour the company's product development and manufacturing testing laboratories, the Information Resource Center and the new Executive Briefing Center. Together, the tours in both buildings will provide you and your family with information on how Data General computers are developed, their markets and their applications.

A good deal of the day's events will take place outside. The areas adjacent to Buildings 14A and 14B will be turned into a street festival. Bands and some of the most talented "street" performers from Quincy Market will entertain you throughout the afternoon.

Hot and cold foods will be available along with soft drinks and ice cream all day long.

Employees attending the event should note that on Saturday, October 10, the driveways to both 3400 Computer Drive and Building 14A and 14B will be closed. Employees entering the open house will use the driveway to 2400 Computer Drive. Employees will be able to park in the north parking lots behind Buildings 14A and 14B.

In the event of rain, all outdoor events will be moved inside. Employees should note that cameras will not be allowed inside any of the facilities during the open house.

According to David Dale, an employee within the Systems Development Division, these tours are designed to provide employees with a better understanding of Data General's development efforts.

"Through significant investment in the best people and state-of-the-art tools and equipment, Data General's research and development groups are generally recognized to be among the best in the computer industry," David says. "We hope the tours on Saturday, October 10, will give employees and their families some insight into what happens in research and development."

Tours For Adults, Children

Throughout the day, tours will be conducted for both adults and adults with children. Volunteers from the development organization will act as tour guides, while others will give demonstrations and answer questions. At the end of each tour, employees interested in finding out more about Data General's development community will be given a copy of "A Year in Development." The 106-page book chronicles the events which take place in Data General's development laboratories during a typical development cycle.

The adult tour, about 90 minutes long, will consist of 11 demonstrations. Some of the topics to be discussed are a retrospective look at Data General's ECLIPSE MV/Family computers, industrial and mechanical design, computer-aided design and computer-aided engineering, chip design, software development, office automation and design assurance engineering. The 45-minute children's tour will include a visit to the Information Resource Center (IRC) where personal computer applications will be displayed. Demonstrations of computer-aided design and chip design will be conducted. In addition, those on the tour will be given a look at the inside of a large computer and a development lab.

Both sets of tours will begin at 10:00 a.m. on October 10, departing every 10 to 20 minutes. The adult tours will commence from the north employee entrance in Building 14A. That is the entrance between the cafeteria and the Building 14B lobby. The adults with children tours will start at the Building 14B lobby. The tours will end at the Building 14A lobby.

"Into '88" Takes A Look At Data General

During Data General's upcoming open house, "Into '88," tours of research and development areas will be conducted for employees and their guests. Engineers, programmers and technicians will be on hand to explain their work and describe the tools they work with and the technologies they use.

How About A Helicopter Ride?

Data General employees and their families attending the open house will be able to get a bird's-eye view of the autumn foliage. Starting at 10:00 a.m., employees can ride the company's helicopter. All rides will be available on a first-come, first-served basis. The helicopter can accommodate four persons at a time. Children must be accompanied by an adult. Rides will last approximately five to ten minutes.

Employees Can Win Computers

Employees who attend the Data General open house will be eligible to win a DATA GENERAL/One computer. In all, 100 DATA GENERAL/One Model 1 computers will be awarded to lucky employees during the afternoon.

To try your luck, simply return the RSVP card which can be found in this newsletter. On the afternoon of October 10, 100 RSVP cards will be randomly selected. Employees whose cards are selected will be notified that they can pick up a DATA GENERAL/One computer, along with a printer, hard carrying case, and software, before heading for home.

Remember, to be eligible to receive a computer, you must be present at the open house. ***The drawing will take place at 2:00 p.m., and the names of the winners will be announced at that time.***

Winners should note that they will be responsible for paying a tax based on the value of their computer. The tax will total about \$96 and can be paid through payroll deduction over three weeks.

Structure Established For VAR Marketing/Development Group

Several director-level assignments have been made within the VAR Marketing and Development Group formalizing the organizational structure of the group which was formed earlier this year. Reporting to group Vice President Ward Mackenzie are: Ed Burke, Art Holmes, John McGlone, Herb Osher, Jan Pieter Scheerder, Mike Taback and John Williams.

Ed Burke has been named director of Peripheral Product Development. Based at the Durham laboratory, Ed manages the development of printer and terminal products.

Ed was most recently director of Research and Development for the former Volume Products Division. Ed joined Data General in 1982 as director of the Research Triangle Park Development laboratory. He came to the company after 11 years at Mitre Corporation. Ed holds a bachelor's degree in electrical engineering from MIT and a master's degree in the same subject from the University of Pennsylvania.

As director of Processor Development, **Art Holmes** will be responsible for the development of low-end and mid-range ECLIPSE MV/Family computer systems.

Art joined Data General last January as director of Central Processor Development within the Systems Development Division (SDD). He came to Data General after 26 years at IBM where he held primarily engineering management positions. Art holds a bachelor's degree in electrical engineering from Northeastern University.

John McGlone is now director of the Reseller Marketing Division, formerly the Distribution Division. He had held that position on an acting basis since earlier this year. John directs the corporate efforts to grow sales through Data General's VAR customers and to attract new resellers of the company's products.

Since joining Data General in 1985, John has held a series of director-level marketing positions. Before joining Data General, John was vice president of sales at Beehive International. He holds a bachelor's degree in marketing from Fordham University.

As Marketing director, **Herb Osher** oversees marketing efforts for high-volume printers, terminals, intelligent workstations and industry-standard systems.

Herb most recently was a product line manager within the Information Systems Group. He has been with Data General since 1974 holding a series of managerial-level positions within marketing and Systems Engineering. Herb holds a bachelor's degree in electrical engineering from City College in New York and a master's degree in computer science from New York University.

Jan Pieter Scheerder is director of Industry Standard Systems Development.

Jan Pieter was most recently director of Performance Analysis within SDD. Prior to that, Jan Pieter was director of Product Marketing within the former Technical Products Division. He joined Data General in 1976 as a Sales engineer in Holland. From there, he trans-

ferred to the company's European headquarters in Paris where he was a marketing specialist until joining the Technical Products Division in Westboro in October 1981. He holds a bachelor's degree in electrical engineering from HTS E in Utrecht, Holland.

The development of technical and commercial workstations is led by **Michael Taback**.

Michael joined Data General last March as director of the Technical Systems Development group within SDD. He came to Data General from Calma Corporation where he was vice president of engineering for four years. Prior to that, Michael was vice president of engineering for a CAE start-up company, and held senior managerial-level positions with ESL Inc. Michael holds master's and bachelor's degrees in electronic engineering from the University of California.

Product marketing and development for the federal government marketplace is the responsibility of Director **John Williams**.

John had been director of Federal Products within the former Federal Systems Division (FSD) since July 1985. Before that, John had been Product Marketing manager within FSD. He joined Data General in 1980 as Marketing manager within Special Systems. Prior to joining Data General, John was with Arthur D. Little Systems. John holds a PhD from Oxford University, a master's degree from New York University and a bachelor's degree from the University of Wales.

New Printers Feature Price/Performance

Six state-of-the art line and serial dot-matrix printers have been introduced at substantial price deductions from previous available models.

The four line printers range in speed from 300-2000 lines per minute (LPM). The 300- and 600-LPM printers are priced as much as 12 percent less than the models they replace. The 1500- and 2000-LPM printers are suited for high-volume applications.

Also announced were two new dot-matrix printers geared for shared resource and personal printer PC-based applications. These models are priced as much as 30 percent less than the models they replace. Both models are capable of 240 characters per second (CPS) high-speed draft printing, 200-CPS utility mode printing, and 100-CPS near-letter-quality printing. The printers provide high-quality text and graphics, and are fully supported by IBM-compatible applications. An optional multi-color printing ribbon is available.

One-Day Battery Service Offered To Portable Users

Users of DATA GENERAL/One Model 1 or Model 2 portable computers may now obtain battery-replacement service faster than ever before.

Data General Field Engineering now offers walk-in service at five designated branch offices around the country - Birmingham, Mich.; Long Beach, Calif.; New York, NY; San Jose, Calif.; and Wellesley, Mass. The selected geographic locations have been found to have the highest concentrations of DATA GENERAL/One users.

Batteries in the DATA GENERAL/One systems have a life of two to three years. Because of the complexity involved and electro-static discharge considerations, replacement of the lithium battery in the Model 1 and the nickel-cadmium battery in the Model 2 must be done by a Field Engineering specialist. The branches will offer one-day service to customers needing replacements for their batteries. (All batteries in the recently-announced DATA GENERAL/One Model 2T computer are user-replaceable.)

In addition, users outside the five areas may obtain expedited two-day battery service at the Product Repair Center (PRC) in Fountain, Colorado. Customers requiring battery service, whether they use walk-in or PRC service, must call the Phone Assistance Center (PAC) at 1-800-DG-HELPS for service authorization.

Earlier this year, employees in and near Westboro who use the portable systems were also given the option of drop-in battery service at the Field Engineering branch in Westboro at Mail Stop D-124. Employees with Model 1 or Model 2 systems requiring battery service must call PAC for service authorization. Employees must provide their cost center number. Units may not be mailed to the branch.

Corporate Typesetting, Publications Fit The Bill

When it comes time to put together a brochure or pamphlet describing a company product or program, not every Data General employee is aware of the company's many services. According to Billie Keese, Corporate Typesetting supervisor, these Data General services can save employees time and money.

"Employees needing typesetting and graphics services can utilize the Corporate Typesetting and Corporate Publications departments in Westboro," Billie says. "We are readily accessible to employees. To make the services even easier to use, some of our typesetting is done with the help of CEO comprehensive electronic office software. This makes us available for last-minute changes."

The Corporate Typesetting department is involved in a number of projects that employees see every day. **Mini News, Interface**, the telephone directory, the library

newsletter, MAPS/PLUS brochures, foreign language documentation and various technical manuals are some of the material this department completes.

"We're versatile," says Nancy Ricciuti, group leader in the department. "While we may not have the font library, or selection of type styles, of some of the bigger outside typesetting firms, we can usually accommodate each employee's needs. We can handle a job as small as an official letter or as large as a completely paginated book. We typeset brochures, calendars and newsletters. Employees can come to us should they need typesetting services."

Another Data General service, Corporate Publications, works hand-in-hand with the typesetting group. If employees need brochures to be designed and pasted-up, Corporate Publications can fill the need.

According to Peter Driver, supervisor of the group, Corporate Publications will select type style and size, create illustrations, choose paper stocks and design a project for an employee.

"We provide illustrating support in many areas," Peter says. "Newsletters and other publications like the new *Interface* look were designed here. Illustrations, report figures, posters, forms and artwork for corporate documentation are handled through this department.

"We aim to get employees' projects completed quickly and accurately," Peter says. "Working closely with Billie and the typesetting group gives us the edge we need to give employees the best service with professional results."

Human Factors Department Needs Volunteers

The Human Factors Engineering department is looking for volunteers to participate in product evaluations. The studies usually involve having volunteers use a new or existing piece of hardware or software and then give comments. Most of the sessions are less than an hour long. Westboro Safety Committee Raises Safety Awareness



The Westboro Safety Committee recently held a Safety Awareness Day in an effort to raise awareness and interest in employee safety among Data General employees. Along with handing out brochures and pamphlets describing various ways to maintain a safe workplace, the committee treated employees to cake and coffee in the main cafeteria in Westboro.

"We want employees to know who we are, and what we do," says Paul Crivello, chairperson of the Safety Committee. "As importantly, we want to point out that we are not a committee in name only. We have valid concerns for the safety of every employee, and we want employees to know what they can do to ensure their workplace is safe."

According to Paul, every major Data General facility has a similar committee that makes employees aware of keeping Data General a safe place to work.

"Just because we in Westboro work in an office environment does not mean we are exempt from safety awareness," Paul says.

Safety Inspections

Each month the Safety Committee, which is made up of 10 employees from various departments throughout Building 14A and 14B, conducts inspections of a number of offices in a certain area. After completing an inspection, the group puts together a list of any safety violations it may have found, and presents the list to the appropriate manager within that department through the mail.

"When we discover a violation or concern, we alert the manager responsible for that area and request that the concern be dealt with in a timely manner," Paul says.

"Of course, some concerns are a matter of house-keeping. For example, we may note that a particular area does not have adequate storage space," Paul says. "After completing our rounds for that month, and submitting requests for changes, we get together to decide how to best handle the issues we have come across during that particular session of inspections. We may get immediate response that the issue has been taken care of. If not, we submit our request again, this time perhaps to a director."

Paul stresses that the committee is concerned with the well-being of employees. The lists and notes generated from any inspection are suggestions, and the committee hopes that supervisors, managers and directors will act upon these suggestions.

"Our committee, by policy, has to consist of someone from Health Services, someone from Corporate Security, and someone from Facilities. We are required to be aware of Occupational Safety and Health Association (OSHA) regulations which pertain to the workplace. We're all volunteers, as well," Paul says. "We are involved because we care. We're a serious entity."

New Logo For Committee

As part of the effort to get employees interested in safety, the Safety Committee held a logo contest for employees. The group asked employees to submit a logo which the committee could use on committee correspondence. From the entries received, the logo drawn by Dianne Morano and Lois Perreault of the Milford facility was chosen. Paul Sullivan of Westboro was chosen for his winning safety slogan, "Dare To Be Aware, Safety Is Your Business." Dianne, Lois and Paul were awarded savings bonds.

In addition, employees Vera Cunningham, Stu Cohen and Andrea Girardi were randomly selected to receive gift certificates to area restaurants.

"We'd like to have Safety Awareness Days throughout the year," Paul says. "After all, safety is an everyday issue."

PSAT Dates For Data General Scholarships Set

If you are a regular full-time Data General employee and have a child who will be graduating from high school in 1989, now is the time to consider applying for a Data General Scholarship. The scholarship program is a Data General benefit established for the children of Data General employees. It is administered by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation. Ten scholarships are awarded each year. The stipend of each scholarship ranges from \$500 to \$2,000 per year for up to four years, or until bachelor's degree requirements are completed, whichever comes first.

Students applying for a Data General scholarship must take the PSAT (Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude

Test) during their junior year in high school. ***This year the test will be administered in high schools throughout the country on October 17 or October 20.*** Interested students should contact their guidance counselors as soon as possible to register for the PSAT.

Keep in mind that application for a Data General scholarship must be made during the students JUNIOR year in high school. Therefore, even students who are currently undecided as to whether or not they want to attend college should be encouraged to take the PSAT in October.

Applications for the Data General Scholarship program are available from the Benefits and Human Resource departments. A letter will be sent to all applicants at the end of December to let them know their entry form was received.

Educational Services is offering the following courses in October. Prior approval of your supervisor is required for course registration. Call (tie line) 221-1647 to enroll in these classes or other classes. All classes are held at the Education Center at 2400 Computer Drive in Westboro.

- **CEO System Operation (S222)** - Employees taking this course will learn the procedures for powering up the computer, and operating system startup, shutdown and backup. Employees also will selected Command Line Interpreter Commands (CLI), execute the components of the CEO system, and effectively maintain the computer system and CEO at an operations level. This course runs for five days and begins on Monday, October 12.

- **PRESENT through CLI (S142)** - This course teaches employees how to create and use queries through CLI that select information from data sources, and how to format this information into reports and charts. Some topics to be discussed include the capabilities of PRESENT, sequential file as a data source, and saving and printing reports and queries. Employees taking this two-day class must have taken S209 (AOS & AOS/VS User) or equivalent experience. The class begins on Monday, October 12.

- **ECLIPSE S140/NOVA 4 S/X Component Level (H321)** - Employees enrolled in this class can learn how to troubleshoot and diagnose the Data General ECLIPSE S140 and NOVA 4 S/X CPU, ERCC, 64K and 128K semiconductor memory, and virtual console asynchronous I/O interface to the chip level. Employees should have taken H100 (Introduction to Data General 16-Bit Computer Systems) and H121 (ECLIPSE S140/NOVA 4 S/X Field Maintenance) to attend this ten-day class, which begins on Monday, October 12.

- **6060/6061/6067/6122 Disc Field Maintenance (H204)** - This ten-day course teaches employees the principles of operation of the moving head disc drive, controller and adapter. The class also covers head alignment and all system adjustments. Interested employees should have taken H100 or H100/MV (Intro to Data General 16 or 32-Bit Computer Systems), any Data General processor Field Maintenance course and should have knowledge of magnetic recording techniques. This class starts on Monday, October 19.
