Software Distribution Packages PRIDE

Improved efficiency and a productive work environment remain a constant goal of Southboro's PRIDE Circle Program. The Software Distribution PRIDE Circle has made a significant contribution to that goal.

Through detailed research, the group identified numerous issues related to their kitting operations. The department packages documentation and software for shipment to customers. One of the kitting steps includes assembling boxes to prepare them for packing.

Until recently, manual tape machines were used in this preliminary kitting step. The PRIDE Circle felt that these manual machines slowed production. Through statistics the Circle compiled, it believed that automated taping machines would improve the department's productivity. Even with the initial ex-

nditure, the department could realize a substantial cost and labor savings while improving department output.

The PRIDE Circle presented its findings last week to a group of managers. Its proposal to purchase

the new taping machines was accepted immediately, and the taping machines already have been installed. In addition, the PRIDE Circle was invited to reenact its findings and proposal at a meeting held by Southboro Plant Manager Dave Foran.

Nancy Jones, one of the presentors, states, "The lines of communication really opened up after this presentation. This has been a real inspiration for us. As a group, we are accomplishing our goals through the PRIDE Circle Program." Another Circle member added, "We saw our positive results work right away, it's a great feeling."

When To Obtain A Second Surgical Opinion

These days smart shopping doesn't end at the supermarket checkout. Wary consumers are also concerned about medical costs for themselves and their families.

In order to avoid extra medical costs and the discomfort related to surgery, the Data General (Prudential) Medical Plan now requires second opinions to qualify for full payment of certain non-emergency surgeries.

Data General's Second Surgical Opinion Program provides a way for you to receive a second opinion on proposed surgery and acquaint you with alternative methods of treatment. Effective April 1, you must receive a second surgical opinion from a participating Board Certified Specialist (a licensed physician) for many non-emergency surgeries. There is no charge to you for this opinion. The specialist will submit the bill directly to Prudential. If the second opinion does not confirm the medical advisability of the proposed second surgery, another examination and opinion are required from a third specialist.

If you decide to seek surgery following a second opinion confirming the need for surgery or a third opinion, medical charges will be paid under the usual provisions of the Data General (Prudential) Medical Plan. Remember, the choice for non-emergency surgeries remains yours. However, if you do not follow the Second Surgical Opinion Program only 80 percent of the reasonable and customary hospital, surgery and other related charges will be covered.

You will be provided with a list of specialists, who are conveniently located, for second opinions. If a specialist is not available in an area near you, a second opinion will not be required and surgery will be paid for as if a second opinion had been obtained.

A second surgical opinion is required for the following non-emergency surgeries:

- Cataract Removal
- Cholecystectomy (gall bladder removal)
- Coronary Bypass
- Hemorrhoidectomy (removal of hemorrhoids)
- Herniorrhaphy (hernia repair)
- Hip Replacement
- Hysterectomy
- Laminectomy (removal of vertebra disc)
- Mastectomy (partial or complete breast removal)
- Meniscectomy (removal of knee cartilage)
- Prostatectomy (removal of the prostate gland)
- Salpingectomy/Oophorectomy (removal of uterine tube and/or ovary)
- Septoplasty
- Submucous Resection (deviated septum repair)

- Tonsillectomy
- Varicose Vein Ligation/Stripping (separating or tying of veins in leg).

Non-emergency means that a slight delay would not cause life-threatening complications and tha the surgery can be scheduled at the doctor's and patient's convenience.

When A Second Opinion Is Needed...

If your doctor recommends non-emergency surgery call the Prudential Insurance Company collect at (617) 236-3409 to obtain a list of Board Certified Specialists in your area. Identify yourself as a member of the Data General (Prudential) Medical Plan and indicate your desire to acquire a second surgical opinion for upcoming surgery.
