Data General Now 339 In Fortune 500 Ranking

Data General has climbed 40 positions to number 339 on Fortune magazine's list of the 500 largest U.S. industrial companies. The ranking is based on Data General's fiscal 1982 revenues of \$805.9 million.

Data General has continued to climb up the Fortune 500 ladder, being ranked at 379 last year; 409 two years ago; and number 500 in 1979, when it first appeared on the prestigious list.

Sales dropped an average 5.7 percent for the Fortune 500 companies, the first decline since 1958. This means that if sales increased in 1982 - Data General's grew by 9 percent - a company could rise faster on the listing.

MHTC Questions Provisions Of Local Aid Package

"Buried beneath the good ideas and positive reforms that were revealed in the local aid package proposed by the Governor and the legislative leadership on Tuesday, April 12, lurks the repeal of one of the most important provisions of Proposition 2 1/2. That is, the right of almost one-fourth of the registered voters in the Commonwealth to determine the rate at which their property can be taxed."

That was the message this past week from the Massachusetts High Technology Council (MHTC) to members of the Massachusetts Legislature and the Governor as debate began on increased local aid to cities and towns. The provision of the proposal in question was a measure that would give the city council in the state's 11 largest communities the right to override Proposition 2 1/2 without going to the voters.

As a director of MHTC, Data General President Ed de Castro joined in the effort to convince legislators. In a telegram to representatives and senators from the Westboro-Southboro-Milford area, Ed said "This proposal in effect disenfranchises the tax-paying citizen without his consent. The voters at the local level should continue to have the right to determine if tax cuts they approved two years ago should be abridged or modified."



At the time Jim submitted his suggestion, he was a packer in Final Prep and Package. He is currently imployed in Southboro's Low Volume Operation. It was a significant contribution to cost savings for Data General. I am sure he will continue to be innovative in his new job and help to motivate employees in Low Volume to participate in the Cost Reduction Program."

HMOs And Medical Emergencies

Clear thinking is important in a medical emergency. Too many people believe severe accidents will never happen to them. But, what if they do? Knowing the necessary procedures to follow for obtaining treatment will save time during critical moments.

If you are enrolled in an HMO, read the section of your Member Handbook concerning medical emergencies. HMOs require you to follow certain procedures to receive coverage of a medical emergency. If these procedures are not followed, you may have to pay any expenses you incur as a result of medical treatment obtained.

- 1. How does your HMO define a "medical emergency"?
- 2. Can you go immediately to a hospital emergency room or must you call your doctor first?
- 3. Must you use a specific hospital?
- 4. What number do you call during normal business hours? After normal business hours?
- 5. What do you do in an emergency situation if you are outside the HMO service area?
- 6. Are there any situations that may not be covered if you are outside the HMO service area?

In most instances your HMO handbook provides answers to each of those questions plus addditional information. If you need further assistance in understanding your HMO benefits and emergency procedures, talk to your primary care physician or call the HMO Membership Service department.




- Paul Abasciano of SID with 22 points in the quarter-finals.
