Top O'The Morning For Irish Students





Paint Shop's Best Color is Quality

Each area within Data General performs specific functions which contribute to the manufacture and sales of computer systems and peripheral equipment. There is a department in Southboro Manufacturing which plays a very distinct role in this process. Located in Building 5, Southboro's Paint Shop has the unique responsibility of giving Data General computer systems something no other area in Southboro can give -- color.




Silkscreening is one important function performed in the Paint Shop. Employee Jim Maher demonstrates how paint is applied through one of more than 800 silkscreens available.

Larry Bliss, Paint Shop supervisor, insures the quality and uniformity of paint application. Working with Larry are employees who are highly motivated to reach quality goals. The Paint Shop has an excellent quality record and during the last year has twice won the Quality Awareness award. In fact, Larry recently earned an individual Quality Leadership award.

He explains that the quality message was brought to the area through weekly meetings and the emphasis on quality over quantity. The Paint Shop comstes thousands of parts per week and over the past five weeks has attained a zero defects record.

According to Larry, the employees in the department are encouraged to be their own inspectors. He observes, "Making employees responsible for each other's workmanship and for checking finished products carefully has helped the Paint Shop not to be so dependant on the Quality department for support. Now employees better understand what it means to produce a defect free product giving them even more pride in their work."

Most of the employees in the Paint Shop have more than five years of experience painting Data General equipment. They work on parts composed of sheet metal, metal castings and plastic. The area also deals with wooden parts which are utilized in the production of prototypes. Plated and painted in the Paint Shop are components used in virtually every system produced in the company.

Traditionally metal, plastic and wood must be specially prepared by etching or cleaning before painting. This makes the surfaces more receptive to paint adhesion. Aluminum parts are plated with chromate, steel is plated with phosphate. Plating parts with these substances prepares the surface for painting, and if a part is not going to be painted the plating inhibits oxidation of the component.

Parts scheduled to be enameled are arranged on a conveyorized system, more than two hundred pieces to a line. Two spray booths are set up, the first coat applied is smooth, after the paint has "flashed" the parts continue to the second booth for a final coat. Larry explains that flashing occurs quickly after the paint is applied, within 30 seconds to one minute. It is the initial phase of drying and when a coat of paint has flashed some chemicals have already evaporated. The second coat is textured, which makes for easy exterior maintenance of Data General computer systems.

Silkscreening also is handled in the Paint Shop. In stock are 800 to 1000 different screens. These are utilized in the production of various signs as well as for product logos which are placed on the outside of a system.

Larry described the complicated process of masking as yet another area of expertise of Paint Shop employees. As one color is applied, the areas not to be painted are covered to protect them. This process can be done layer after layer and masks changed as different areas are exposed to paint. This process is very effective for applying multiple colors to a unit. Masking is also used to protect certain electrical features on a system. Paint must never be applied to electrical contacts because it acts as a buffer.

Most recently the Paint Shop completed a order for the DESKTOP GENERATION computers used in their introduction in New York City. Larry adds, "We all worked extremely hard to assure that the job was done right and on time. I am very proud of the cooperation within the department. There was a real group effort as employees made their contribution to the success of the new product line."

Southboro Rated #1 After Plant Safety Audit

For winning the Annual Domestic Manufacturing Plant Safety Audit, Southboro employees are celebrating a well-earned victory. Scoring 395 out of a possible 400 points, Southboro edged Apex, which came in second with 393 points, and the other audited plants -- Westbrook, Austin, Portsmouth and Clayton.

According to Southboro Plant Manager Dave Foran, one year ago he hoped the Safety Committee could address various safety issues to provide an even safer work environment for employees while improving Southboro's standing in this year's audit. He states, "There was an impressive change in overall site safety and the committee developed extremely effective programs which helped employees to maintain a safe workplace environment. It was because employees did their part that Southboro was able to win the audit."

Dave explains that it was the dedication of the entire committee that made him even more aware of the importance of a strong site safety campaign. In place are programs ranging from training sessions pertaining to material handling and shop and office safety to increased communications on all safety related topics. Additionally, the Workplace Review Safety Sub-committee performs weekly on site inspections. This insures that all departments take full repsonsibility for maintaining their areas.

Dave notes that not one violation was found during the two and a half hour housekeeping phase of the audit. "Southboro responded to what needed to be done and Committee Chairperson Ken Lowry has done an excellent job in motivating the Safe Committee members as well as each employee in meeting the safety goals set within the facility." Ken adds, "Chairing the committee was a lot tougher job than I thought, but I was dedicated to the job and received strong support from everyone. As we continue our work the challenge will be in staying on top so we can win again during the next audit."

Cost Reduction Program Has Three Time Winner

Bob DeJordy supervisor of Stockroom 3 in Southboro has once again made a winning suggestion to the SIO (Systems Integration Operation) Cost Reduction Program. An eleven year Data General employee, Bob has twice before submitted ideas which have won him Cost Reduction Awards.

The most recent of Bob's suggestions involved the "recycling" of boxes used to transport battery kits from the Stockroom to the Assembly and Test areas. These boxes were used just once and then discarded at the point of delivery. Bob's idea was to route these boxes back to the Stockroom so they could be used again.

Joyce Barrus of SIO Industrial Engineering and Cost Reduction program coordinator investigated the suggestion. During her study, she found that in addition to the money savings, more time was saved by recycling the boxes than by employees having tassemble new ones.

Bob's idea has now been implemented and the boxes are being "recycled." Each box may be used up to six times before being discarded.

Marty Glebus Southboro Materials manager and Stan Skarbek Materials section manager were on hand to present Bob with a Cost Reduction Certificate. They both agree that this third award monstrates Bob's active role in adding to the productivity of the company. Marty states, "When employees take the time to think about work related issues and then provide solutions for them, it contributes a great deal to their departments. Employee suggestions like Bob's are extremely rewarding and they help Data General meet set objectives."

New Employees Watch Your Mailbox

Descriptive material for the Data General Savings and Investment Program will be mailed to the home of those employees who will be eligible to participate in the Program for the first time as of October 1, 1983. To be eligible, you must have completed 90 days of employment with Data General before October 1.

You should receive the descriptive material the week of August 22. Read the information carefully. The Data General Savings and Investment Program provides a unique opportunity for you to prepare for your future financial needs, such as retirement, purchase of a home or the education of your children.

The Data General Savings and Investment Program allows you to save a portion of your pay (up to 10 percent), and lets you do it in before-tax dollars.

It's like an Individual Retirement Account (IRA), but more attractive. Read the descriptive material to learn about the investment options -- Guaranteed Income Fund, Balanced Fund and Equity Fund -- and the loan and withdrawal provisions.

An additional feature of the Program is the Data General contribution. Each year, Data General will make a contribution of Data General stock to eligible employees. Eligible employees are those with at least six months of service and actively employed by the company on December 31 of each year.

The Guaranteed Income Fund will pay an effective annual rate of 12.5 percent until the end of 1983. The interest rate for 1984 will be announced before January 1. If you have questions concerning the Balanced or Equity Funds, call The Putnam Management Company at 1-800-343-0909. All other questions may be directed to your Personnel representative or the Corporate Benefits department, Westboro extension 4524 or 4562.

All newly eligible employees *must* complete the enrollment form even if they decide not to participate at this time. You must fill out the beneficiary section of the form for purposes of the Data General contribution to the Program. All enrollment forms should be returned to the Corporate Benefits department (D138) no later than September 16.

Savings & Investment Program Quarterly Changes Due

September 16 is an important date for those employees actively participating or eligible to participate in the Data General Savings and Investment Program. September 16 is the deadline for submitting all new enrollments and changes to the Benefits section of the Personnel department.

To be eligible to participate, you must have completed 90 days of employment with Data General by October 1.

By completing the Savings and Investment Program enrollment form, you can:

- Elect to save a portion of your pay, if you are not already doing so; or
- 2. Change the percentage of your pay you wish to set aside each pay period commencing October 1: or
- 3. Change the investment elections for future savings deductions. You may elect to have earnings saved on and after October 1 directed to the Balanced Fund, Equity Fund or Guaranteed Income Fund -or a combination of these funds.

All earnings you elect to set aside each pay period are on a pre-tax basis -- one of the many advantage of this Program. If you are not now saving a portion of your earnings (up to 10 percent) or fail to submit an enrollment form by September 16, you will be

able to enroll at the beginning of the next calendar quarter (January 1).


New England Competitors

How To Save It


When office space becomes limited, records. files, magnetic tapes, discs and other material containing important information can be sent to a central location for storage. These archives, stored at Instar Corporation of Malden, Mass., can be placed and retrieved whenever needed, freeing departments to store more current records.

When material is to be stored or retrieved from Instar, a Records Control form must be completed and returned to Records Coordinator Josephine Laptewicz of Accounting in Westboro (x5695, MS-E236). According to Josephine, the six-part form should be filled out correctly to ensure the material put away is properly stored.

"One copy of the form, which MUST be typed, is attached to the box containing the material to be stored," says Josephine. "The second copy is kept on file by the department, while copies three through six are to be placed inside the box."

When filling out the form, make sure to place your department's cost center number in the space next to "Add. Ident.," section number 3 on the form. Spaces 4 and 5 can be left blank. "The most important part of the form is section 6, "R.S. No.," explains Josephine. "In this space goes the code to let departments know what is in the box and how long that box is to be stored. These code numbers are supplied by Accounting when the forms are filled out. Departments also should take care to list on the form the contents of each box so the proper material is received whenever it needs to be retrieved."

The "Record Year," segment 7, lists the year the documents being stored were produced. The "Retention Period In Years," section 8, tells Instar how long material is to be kept. "Whenever a disposal date is reached (section 10)," explains Josephine, "Instar will contact me and the respective department to make sure the material can indeed be disposed. It is a safeguard that ensures we are not tossing away needed material." Josephine adds that nothing will be stored unless the department manager or supervisor's name appears in section 11.
