AOS/VS Monitoring Tool Increases Operation

A performance monitoring tool for 32-bit ECLIPSE information systems using the Advanced Operating System/Virtual Storage (AOS/VS) operating system lets users analyze their system environment. With the AOS/VS Performance Monitor users can determine the operational state of their system and tune their systems environment for a more balanced loading of the application to achieve higher throughput.

The AOS/VS Performace Monitor provides information about the seven major areas of the AOS/VS operating system: memory management, demand paging, disc I/O, the scheduler, process management, CPU utilization, and character I/O.

All information being monitored can be logged into a disc file for later analysis. The software has a built-in program that lets users print hard copy.

Customer training classes will be provided by Data General to help customers interpret results produced by the Performance Monitor. The AOS/VS Performance Monitor is priced at \$6,000 which includes the customer training class and a one year Software Subscription Service.

He's Raising 'Uke' Consciousness



By day, he is a dedicated systems engineer, demonstrating the virtues of Data General's Comprehensive Electronic Office (CEO) software for customers who want to increase productivity within their businesses.

At night, he also commands an audience. However, this time it is an ever-growing following of devout music lovers who come to see Robert Wheeler's inique musical ability.

What makes Robert's talents different from any other performer is evident in the instrument which he plays -- the ukulele. Around these parts of the United States, 'uke' players are not a common sight. In fact, since Arthur Godfrey passed away, you would be hard pressed to find anyone east of Hawaii who gets top billing for playing the four-stringed instrument. Until now.

As Robert likes to say, albeit, only half seriously, he is doing his part to raise the level of 'ukulele consciousness' in New England. Since last December, he has been appearing every Wednesday evening during 'Talent Nights' at Sacco's, a Watertown night club. The increasingly larger crowds who come to see Robert perform every week are an indication of his appeal and popularity.

Success has not come easy for Robert, though. The one-time student of the classical guitar may be the only person to hit a musical home run after three strikes. After taking up the ukulele in 1976, his first performances were before inmates at correctional facilities in Eastern Massachusetts. The experience of appearing before an audience was valuable, says Robert, but it was not as if he were playing for people who really wanted to be there.

"After I got a few performances under my belt, a rriend invited me to play at a club in Brighton," recalls Robert. "I played there three times and, to be honest, I got worse each time. I forgot the music, I was terrible."

Despite the 'strikeout,' Robert learned a good lesson. "Even though I was so bad, each time I finished the people in the audience would pat me on the back and tell me how much they enjoyed my music. That was an inspiration."

It was the audience's reaction which convinced Robert to "focus" even more on mastering the ukulele. "When you put time and energy into something, you can only get better at it," Robert explains. "It's like the first time I demonstrated CEO for customers. I was nervous about standing before the groups who came in to see the product. But, by continually doing it, my confidence grew. It's the same with performing. Instead of stepping aside and giving up on the 'uke,' I was determined to keep practicing and playing."

And play he has. Today, Robert owns 16 ukeleles, one costing \$354. "What killed the ukulele was the electric guitar," explains Robert. "In the early part of this century, it was an extremely popular instrument."

He is usually "the first ukulele player at any of the clubs I've ever been to." Robert explains that because of the ukulele and his soft voice, audiences always seem to listen closely to his songs. "While my voice has gotten considerably better since the first time I performed, I have an advantage in that it is soft so that people tend to remain quiet throughout my act so they can be sure to hear." While Robert has written a few songs, most of those he performs were written in the 1920s, 30s and 40s.

The best testament to the audience's delight with Robert's abilities as a ukulele player is exemplified after he completes each performance. Instead of merely clapping, listeners fill the club with chants of uke, uke, uke..., curtailing their emotions only after Robert has departed the stage.

"Now I know how Carl Yastrzemski feels after hitting one out of the park."

Manufacturing Achieves Quality Through Feedback

Employees contributing ideas to Data General are an important part of how the company stays competitive in the computer market place. In an effort to meet the growing and changing needs of Data General's customers, Quality Engineer Steve Verdone is doing his part to support Manufacturing's commitment to delivering highly reliable products.

About a year ago Steve began redesigning the reporting formats for weekly and monthly statistics obtained through test procedures. The first step in

developing a new set of software programs was determining what kind of information engineers in Southboro and other Data General Manufacturing plants were looking for regarding the quality and reliability of components.

Southboro and Apex are Data General's two Systems Integration facilities. It is at these plants that processors and peripherals are integrated to customer specifications and then tested for functionality as a complete unit. Although all Data General components are tested for reliability at feeder and vendor facilities, integration testing assures the smooth functioning of systems as new products and configurations are introduced.

Steve explains that he developed a software program in three parts to report information on quality in the most effective way possible. He wrote one program to accept data, another to process this data into a useable format and a third to generate charts and graphs. On a weekly basis the first two programs are used and distributed within Southboro. The graphics portion of this set of programs forms the core of a Manufacturing-wide quality information network. Component and system failures, numbers of systems tested and average number of failures per unit are clearly defined through charts and graphs. Steve notes, "This monthly report is distributed to all Manufacturing plants, it is effectively supplying needed feedback to all sites."

According to Steve, this project was very extensive and it took several weeks of 'brainstorming' with engineers to come up with a workable plan. 'It was important to decide what kind of information would help each plant improve existing quality levels, this format provides accurate test results quickly. The easy-to-read graphics display, at a glance, how various systems are testing at the integration level."

Pleased with the programming Steve has developed, Southboro Quality Manager Dave Smith comments on how he took this project and came out with an excellent format. According to Dave, the reporting system has proved to be an effective tool for identifying and resolving problems. The feeder plants supplied their ideas as he was developing the monthly report. "This report keeps everyone informed of corrective action that may be needed.

Steve's effort is really part of a Manufacturing-wide team approach to provide the highest quality products in the industry. The programs he designed also will be used in Apex as we work toward the goal of compatible reporting from integration operations."

Renaissance Ships First Fully Refurbished System

Southboro Manufacturing's newly-formed Renaissance Systems recently shipped its first Data General computer system. Although a substantial number of peripherals have already been ordered and deliv-

ered to customers, this organization which is dedicated to refurbishing used Data General equipment is now fully operational. Renaissance Systems is the manufacturing arm of the Westboro-based Coninuing Products Division.

According to Renaissance Systems Manager Jack Bush the first shipment, an ECLIPSE C / 150 computer, was a milestone for this Manufacturing operation. Says Jack, "Renaissance Systems was still in the idea phase this past winter, now it is a well-staffed viable business." Equipment is acquired through a variety of sources such as internally used systems. Equipment also is obtained through customers 'trading up' for new Data General systems. When equipment becomes available the CRA (Customer Returns Area) gives Renaissance Systems the option of taking certain returned products as stock. Jack notes, "I am working closely with Continuing Products, price lists have been generated and together we have been able to determine what products have wide marketablity."

The sale was dependent on Renaissance Systems being able to refurbish and ship the system on short notice. Generally one month is standard for processing an order for a system. However, the customer needed almost immediate delivery and Renaissance Systems was able to respond. Engineer Gary Arthur explains, "All the employees involved worked very well together." When a system is refurbished it must be tested, cleaned and ECO (Engineering Change Orders) levels brought up to date to assure system reliability.
