Westbrook's Quality Improvements Applauded

Continuing quality improvements in mag tapes and disc drives made at Data General-Westbrook recently were applauded by representatives of General Electric's (GE) Medical Systems Division.

GE's Medical Systems Division, based in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, has been using Data General computer systems for seven years as a key element of its CT diagnostic scanners.

A CT, or CAT (computer axial or computer-aided tomography), scanner is a computer-aided device that goes a step beyond the X-ray in helping doctors diagnose illnesses. CT scanners give doctors three-dimensional pictures of bones, muscle and soft body tissue. GE's CT business has grown rapidly since its first system was installed in September 1971.

In a recognition ceremony at Data General's Maine Manufacturing facility, GE representatives unfurled a banner recognizing employees from the Zebra and Zebra Adapter, and Mag Tape production lines and support departments for their continuing quality improvement efforts. The banner, stating: "Congratulations, Westbrook - You Have the Maine Ingredient - Quality Peripherals," is being hung above the lobby entrance so that it is visible to the entire Production area.

"We've come here today to give you thanks for the work you've put into this product. Thanks for the quality improvements. This product works right the first time," said Dale Renken, GE's CT Product Quality Manager.


"You've done an outstanding job in terms of making the product better," said Jim Curtiss, GE's CT Manufacturing Operations manager. GE is first in the CT industry, thanks to the efforts of Data General employees building high-quality and highly reliable products, the GE plant manager added.

As part of the recognition ceremony, Westbrook employees told the GE representatives about Data General's quality efforts. "Quality doesn't end with this presentation," said Assembly Group Leader Pat Merritt of Mag Tape. Also speaking were Greg Baker, Zebra group leader/technician, and Victoria Grant, Fab group leader/production painter.

Joe Carlozzi, Westbrook's Quality Assurance manager, says the recognition carries weight in light of GE Medical Systems' rigorous quality standards. GE tests each CT unit for more than 300 hours before shipping it to a customer, and then guarantees continuous uptime. The product cannot fail when a patient is being examined, said Jim Curtiss.

Each GE system installed today contains a Data General ECLIPSE S/140 central processing unit, a 6020 Mag Tape and a 192MB disc drive which process data from the GE data acquisition system (DAS) into images.

Following the presentation, there was an opportunity for employees to enjoy refreshments and to discuss their work with the GE representatives.

GE Medical Systems is pursuing the next step in medical diagnostic technology with nuclear magnetic resonance (NMR) devices. Data General is supplying ECLIPSE MV/4000 central processing units and model 6236 disc drives for GE's NMR machines.

The appreciation of Westbrook's accomplishments is the third time within the past 18 months that GE Medical Systems has recognized the efforts of Data General employees. President Ed de Castro, on behalf of all employees, has accepted an "Award of Appreciation" for the quality of Data General's products used in CT scanners.

Data General-Apex employees have received a banner similar to Westbrook's, heralding Data General's quality and the PRIDE Circle program with the slogan, "Hey!! Apex - Your 'PRIDE' Is Showing - The Quality Performance Of Your Classy Chassis."

ECLIPSE MV/8000 II Ships Through Team Effort

The first shipment of a new computer system is a very important milestone in the development of a product. When the first new ECLIPSE MV/8000II computers shipped from Southboro Manufacturing recently it represented the way teamwork assures the timely delivery and reliability of a new product.

According to Tom Knapp, Southboro project manager of the ECLIPSE MV/8000II system, the key to the project was the cooperation that existed between all the facilities involved in developing and manufacturing this system. He explains, "More than one year before the product was announced regular meetings were scheduled with representatives from all the organizations within the company who were participating in the product's development."

The Westboro-based Engineering and Design Assurance Engineering (DAE) groups and Southboro, Portsmouth and Westbrook Manufacturing worked together to formulate a comprehensive plan to develop the product including sample builds of the system

and an integrated test plan. Through weekly meetings all issues regarding the system were shared. Manufacturing worked closely with Engineering during the initial build and test activities on the system. Using additional sample units which were built by Manufacturing, DAE and the plants further qualified the product through a variety of acceptance tests. These tests included, diagnostic checks for hardware and software fuctionality, compatibility with various peripherials as well as numerous environmental tests. Another form of testing measured EMI emissions to assure the ECLIPSE MV/8000II computer would be fully compliant with Federal Communications Commission (FCC) regulations.

Acting New Products Manager Tom Maziarz explains that all the departments involved had the common goal of shipping a highly reliable product, "Through the integrated test plan we worked together. As the sample builds were produced and tested at different levels, various issues regarding quality and performance developed. DAE and the plants had the opportunity to interact continually with Engineering to resolve those issues. This kind of direct communication had a very positive impact on product reliability. Sharing information pertaining to each group's area of responsibility and expertise has resulted in a smooth introduction of this product to Manufacturing."


