#### Data General Shines On The Silver Screen

Now playing at your local theatre is "After Hours," a motion picture starring Griffin Dunne, Rosanna Arquette and the Data General DESKTOP GENERATION Model 30 computer system. The Data General equipment makes its silver screen appearance in the movie's first and last scenes which take place in an automated office environment.

Directed by Martin Scorcese of "Taxi Driver" and "Raging Bull" fame, After Hours is a comedy that involves Griffin as a word processor who one night sets out in New York City to meet his would-be girlfriend, Rosanna, at a friend's apartment. The story unfolds as Griffin trails Rosanna throughout the city, and encounters many strange happenings along the Y.

To portray the contrasting roles of Griffin as the "mild-mannered" word processor by day, adventurer by night, Scorcese requested of Data General a word processing system for scenes that took place at the publishing company where Griffin is an editor.

For the production, Lynne Rogers of the System Suppliers group in Westboro, assisted by Technical Support Specialist Tony Quatela, arranged a 12-user configuration. Lynne also included CEO Comprehensive Electronic Office software that was easily understood by the actors.

Lynne instructed the film's star and another actor on how to operate the system. Griffin enjoyed using the computer, as he later commented, "I didn't think it was a real computer at first, because it was so easy to operate."

Lynne, Tony and Ken Donoghue of Corporate Public Relations made the trip to New York City where the film crew was on location at "El Diario-La Prensa," headquarters of New York's largest Spanish newspaper. At 8 p.m., the word processing systems owned by the newspaper were cleared out and Data General's advanced technology brought in. Thanks to the efforts of the Data General employees, the system was unpacked and installed in less than an hour-and-a-half. Filming took place on schedule and continued throughout the night until 4 a.m.

Lynne was excited by the whole experience, and glad to have helped out. "What a great experience to watch a famous movie director shoot a scene. His attention to detail was amazing. Everything was staged in its proper place right down to the last paperclip on someone's desk," exclaims Lynne.

"At one point, the director asked my advice on whether or not the scene looked real, having the characters all seated at their terminals typing away. I suggested that maybe a few employees should be huddled over coffee in a meeting, or simply talking on the phone. I was happy to assist."

Remarking on his experience, Tony adds, "The last scene, which was filmed at night, appears in the movie to have taken place during the day. To create the illusion of daylight, the crew covered all the windows of the building with white paper, and directed floodlights in from the outside. What a production!"

Working "after hours," Data General employees supported the cast and crew of what the Boston Globe calls "the next cult film," giving the movie its four-star seal of approval.

# Systems Engineering Establishes Career Development Program

Systems Engineering has launched an innovative career development program that encourages employees to develop their own career paths. The

Says Wayne, "Through this donation, Data General seeks to establish a close relationship with Korea's academic institutions and corporations, assisting them in their research and development efforts."

Used in connection with an ECLIPSE MV/8000 system, the ECLIPSE MV/10000 computer further allows for the creation of a local network called KORNET that links the various departments within the facility. This network enables further educational and research capabilities.

# Employees May Purchase DATA GENERAL/One At A Discount

The price of a basic DATA GENERAL / One computer available through the Employee Purchase Program has been cut to \$1200. For employees, this results in a 55 percent discount from the list price.

A basic system consists of the DATA GENER-AL/One personal portable computer with 256 KB of memory and two built-in disk drives. If you should decide to purchase a system with additional internal equipment, the regular discount rates from the list prices will apply.

The following discounts apply to ADDITIONAL items:

- 45 percent for hardware (expansion chassis, printer, etc.).
- 45 percent for software.
- 30 percent for supplies and accessories (carrying case, battery charger, battery pack, etc.).
- 30 percent for upgrades.

Payment can be made by personal check, payroll deductions for part or all of the purchase amount, or cash. If paid in cash (personal checks will be accepted), an additional 10 percent can be deducted from the total net employee discount purchase price.

Employees interested in purchasing a DATA GENERAL/One should pick up an informational package at Human Resources. Employees should note that the DATA GENERAL/One catalog in the purchase

kit may not include the latest prices for additional hardware, software and accessories. Contact Order Administration in Westboro at x5316 to receive the vdated prices.

#### Already Purchased A DATA GENERAL/One?

Since the Employee Purchase Program for the DATA GENERAL/One computer was introduced last June, several employees have purchased the portable system. However, they will take advantage of the new, reduced price.

# New Courier Service For Overseas Shipping

A new international courier service now is available for Data General employees shipping envelopes and small packages overseas. This service is not a replacement for the regular United States Post Office Air Mail service, but is to be used only for URGENT shipments which previously were being sent by more costly couriers.

Due to the volume of international envelopes and small packages shipped by Data General, Corporate International Trade Operations has negotiated a contract with two major couriers. Previously, the courier selection was handled by individual departments. Now, through shipping greater volumes through two major couriers, Data General will realize a higher level of service and reliability, and most importantly, a projected savings of thousands of dollars.

Purolator Courier has been awarded the service to the following European countries: Austria, Belgium, Denmark, Finland, France, Ireland, Italy, Netherlands, Norway, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, United Kingdom and West Germany. Airborne Express has been awarded all remaining countries.
