Development Employees Ready For The Future

The recent Central Processor Development (CPD) conference in Woodstock gave Data General's hardware developers an opportunity to "rally together" for the year ahead. It was a time for them to look back at their recent achievements in product design, discuss the latest in technological trends, and focus on Data General's next generation of computer systems.

During the conference, speakers from various sales, marketing, development and service organizations outlined Data General's position in the computindustry and its direction.

Among the presenters were Business Group Senior Vice President Bob Miller and Business Group Marketing Vice President Dave Lyons.

In his remarks, Bob first applauded the "stellar group of engineers" for their talent in developing products that make Data General a forerunner in the computer industry. Looking ahead to the future, he discussed marketing strategies and what Data General is doing to remain a top supplier of information processing solutions.

Bob then went on to convey comments made by consultants who gave Data General "high marks" as an industry leader. He cited a recent report by the Gartner Group, a computer industry consulting firm, which stated that, "Data General continues to demonstrate significant talent in technology with the new ECLIPSE MV/2000 DC and ECLIPSE MV/20000 products, as well as in software, with the distributed AOS/DVS version of its operating systems."

Dave then provided customer reaction to Data General's products announced last November. He said, "Market acceptance of our new ECLIPSE MV/Family of computers has been excellent. E.F. Hutton's first vice president of communications and programming says this about its ECLIPSE MV/20000

stem, 'We are running our normal applications on it and it hums. We have not yet quantified it through performance parameters, but it is amazing how fast it goes.'''

Added Dave, "Beneficial thought installation of its ECLIPSE MV/2000 DC 'looked too easy.' Says its office automation vice president, 'I suspect this type of system is the machine of the future.'

Dave closed his portion of the program giving much of the credit for positive customer reaction to the new computers to the developers. He said, "Frankly, you are the most important resource we have in our efforts to stay ahead. We are counting on you to design and develop our next generation of systems," Dave said.

Other guest speakers included Professor Michael Dertouzous of MIT and Data General's Scientific Advisory Board who examined technological futures, and Dr. Neal Thornberry, senior partner and cofounder of Organization Dimensions, who presented and moderated a well-received session devoted to project teamwork.

In addition to the presentations, conference attendees participated in technical seminars, which covered a wide range of topics from optical disk technology, to semi-custom component technology to design tools. This provided developers with information to help perform their responsibilities.

Following the conference, developers were more than pleased with their three days at Woodstock. Says Randy Johnson, a principal engineer in the Systems Sustaining area, "The conference was very enlightening. CPD engineers got together not only as a group with a common purpose, but also as individuals. It was an opportunity to meet those people working on other projects and discuss with them how their design efforts paralleled your own."

Summing it all up, Don Wade, Integrated Systems manager, remarks, "The conference was a time to meet together as a department and get charged up and ready for the next round of new products."

Director's Awards Presented At CPD Conference

Central Processor Development (CPD) Director's Awards for outstanding contributions to a product

development project were presented at the recent CPD conference at Woodstock to Bob Gelinas, Tom Myer and James Mumford.

In presenting the awards, CPD Director Bill Avery said, "Congratulations go to these employees who extended a concerted effort to get the job done right and on time. Their dedication and exemplary contributions to key projects within CPD are representative of the group as a whole."

Bob received the honor for developing software simulation tools, while at the same time performing his hardware design responsibilities on new products. Taking the initiative, he created two software simulation tools, and specified and started the implementation of a new simulation engine. This was integrated into Data General's simulation environment. The overall result was a more powerful simulation capability running on ECLIPSE MV/Family computers. This will be used in the development of new products.

Tom was responsible for the development of the microcode for the ECLIPSE MV/2000 DC and the DS/7000-series of engineering workstations. He won the award for effectively coordinating and resolving issues involving the microcode releases for CPD, Software Development, Manufacturing and field installations during the successful introduction of these products.

Jim received the Director's Award for his work on the ECLIPSE MV/20000 computer project, despite a tight deadline. He delivered approximately 25 percent of the ECLIPSE MV/20000 system diagnostic microcode, a critical portion of the system's development which was used by most of the other developers.

Memory Capacity Doubled

Data General has doubled the maximum memory capacity of the ECLIPSE MV/2000 DC computer and the DS/7500 engineering workstation. Custoers now will have available to them four- and eighter megabyte expansion memory modules for both systems, increasing the systems' maximum memory by 100 percent.

"The new four- and eight-megabyte expansion memory modules will give Data General customers even greater flexibility in configuring packaged office and engineering workstations," says Dave Lyons, vice president for Business Group Marketing. "The new memory upgrade packages will offer twice the memory at a very reasonable price."

The ECLIPSE MV/2000 DC computer and the DS/7500 engineering workstation were introduced last November. Both systems incorporate a single 15-inch printed circuit board that includes two megabytes of parity-memory based on 256-KB DRAM chips. The new four-megabyte module, Model 8924-D, and the new eight-megabyte module, Model 8924-E, add to the series of half-height memory modules (one-, two- and three-megabyte capacity) currently available. The two new modules are also based on 256-KB memory chips.

The new 10-megabyte memory maximum on the ECLIPSE MV/2000 DC and DS/7500 systems is achieved by adding the new eight-megabyte memory module to the two megabytes of standard memory Both systems still may support only one expansion memory module.

The four-megabyte module Model 8924-D is priced at \$8,600. The eight-megabyte module Model 8924-E is priced at \$17,200. Both are available 60 days upon receipt of order.

Disk Drive Capacity Expanded

Data General has introduced a 160-megabyte, 5 1/4 inch Winchester disk drive that increases the maximum disk storage capacity of the company's packaged office systems and engineering workstation products by 33 percent.

The Model 6363 160-megabyte disk drive expands the memory options on Data General's ECLIPSE MV/2000 DC and ECLIPSE MV/4000 DC computers, and the DS/7500 engineering workstation. These systems support up to two disks and currently are available with a choice of 38-, 70- or 120-megabyte disk units.

"The new 160-megabyte memory package strengthens Data General's commitment to package aged office and engineering products," commerces Bob Johnson, director of Marketing Support for the Information Systems Division. "By increasing disk capacity, we can now offer customers with growing

data storage requirements more flexibility and choice at a significantly better price/performance-about \$59/MB--than other 5 1/4-inch disk drives."

The Model 6363 160-megabyte Winchester disk rive is priced at \$9,500 and is available immediate-

Employees Participate In Community Discussion

Data General and the community - that was the topic about 25 Data General employees who live in the town of Westboro discussed last week during a meeting hosted by the Public Affairs department.

Public Affairs Director Brad Stroup opened the one-hour session by telling attendees that the "first-time meeting" came about in response to an employee suggestion to bring employees "up-to-date" on Data General's community involvement with the town. As a result, all employees working in Buildings 14A and 14B who reside in Westboro were invited to attend the discussion. "We are looking for your advice," said Brad. "Employees may be able to help the company and the town strengthen their relationship."

Government and Community Affairs Manager John Moriarty stated that "Our work with the town has increased over the past couple of years. We are

Iping Westboro address issues that have arisen due to its rapid growth. For example, we now have employees serving on its Chamber of Commerce and Traffic Committee. This type of participation helps the company to become a good neighbor within the community."

Donations Administrator Dave Dimmick reviewed the company's cash and equipment donation programs with the town. Over the past three years, Data General has donated \$1.5 million in computer equipment to various civic and educational groups in Westboro. That includes donations this year of an ECLIPSE MV/4000 DC, an ECLIPSE MV/2000 DC and several DATA GENERAL/One personal portable computers to the high school. And in 1986, Dave added, the company already has donated about \$26,000 in cash to various civic, educational and non-profit organizations in Westboro. This includes the donations to 10 town groups and the high school made when the company marked its 10th anniversary in Westboro last December.

Communications and Advanced Systems Director Don Tocher reviewed the company's computer project with Westboro High School. The experimental project may help teachers and students integrate Pata General 32- and 16-bit computers into their aily school activities. As a Westboro resident, Don has taken special interest in helping the school take full advantage of the computers.

A general discussion gave employees an opportunity to raise issues ranging from traffic congestion on Computer Drive to future plans for Rt. 9.

According to Brad, the meeting showed that a number of employees are interested in the company's involvement with the town and want to learn more about how they can participate. As a result, employees will be notified of future meetings so they can continue to be kept abreast of events surrounding the company and the town.

Channel 2 Receives Company Support

An interesting item came up for bid last week on the annual Channel 2 auction. No, it was not a famous painting donated by an anonymous collector of rare art works. Nor was it a 35-foot yacht.

Rather, the auction item was a DATA GENER-AL/One Model 1 portable personal computer system. The unit, complete with 512 KB-memory, sold for a high bid of nearly \$3000.

The Data General equipment was introduced on the public television station by a minute-long video tape with a voice-over detailing the specifics of the portable machine. Featured in the "commercial" were Educational Services Director Rich Jaross and Donations Adminstrator Dave Dimmick of Public Affairs. Rich displayed the various components of the machine such as the two internal 3-and-1/2-inch disk drives and portable printer - showing its ease of use. Dave packed up the light weight laptop, carrying it out of the office and onto the Data General helicopter to demonstrate its portability. The 60-second spot gave Channel 2 viewers a good look at the compact, personal computer system "for business people on the go."

The DATA GENERAL/One Model 1 portable personal computer system was donated by Data General to support the public broadcasting channel. WGBH-Channel 2 offers viewers educational programs such as Frontline, Nova, Masterpiece Theater, Evening At The Pops and Julia Child's Kitchen. These programs can be seen by a weekly audience of two million viewers, on average. Support of the non-profit organization helps keep quality programming on the air, which employees can enjoy.

Sole Sponsor Of Frontline Series

In addition to supporting the Channel 2 Auction, Data General also is the sole sponsor for the local broadcast of Frontline, a highly-acclaimed news show. Frontline is Channel 2's weekly public affairs documentary series.

Like 60 Minutes or Nightline, Frontline takes an in-depth look at current issues in the news. An interesting Frontline program that already aired is

one that took viewers inside a a real-life "closed-door" jury session and a following show covered the controversial "Star Wars" strategic defense initiative.

A Channel 2 official, Susan Lewis, expresses her appreciation of Data General's support of Frontline in this way: "By helping to fund Frontline, Data General has made a significant contribution to a successful year for WGBH. Outstanding programming on Channel 2 and WGBH Radio-FM is literally made possible by underwriting grants from the corporate community. We sincerely appreciate your participating as a corporate sponsor.

"The additional donation of computer equipment helps to ensure the continued success of the Channel 2 Auction and bolsters the entire WGBH Educational Foundation," she adds.

Data General has supported Channel 2 through computer equipment donations and cash contributions for the past five years.

Artificial Intelligence -An Emerging Technology

Any computer aficionado will tell you that the market for artificial intelligence (AI) products is expected to do one thing over the next several years - grow. It has been estimated that the market for AI-related products is expected to balloon from a \$700-million industry today to about \$4 billion in 1990.

To gain a share of the Al market, Data General created an Al Business Unit in November 1985. Led by Director Peter Jessel, the business unit provides the full spectrum of product planning and marketing functions to support the development of a complete set of Al products and services. Many of these products are being developed in Research Triangle Park, under the direction of Bill Lahti.

Al is a set of rules by which computers attempt to replicate human thinking. As Peter explains, "A branch of Al, known as 'expert' systems, captures human knowledge as a set of 'rules.' These rules then are used by expert systems to analyze siturations and reach decisions. Expert systems act a 'assistants' to employees within a particular industry, allowing them to become more productive.

"For example, expert systems already have been developed to diagnose computers, bake Oreo cookies and analyze loan applications." adds Peter.

Because of the potential sales within this market, Peter sees Al as a technology which must be integrated into the mainstream of a company's operations. He comments, "Data General is ideally positioned to provide this integrated environment as a natural extension to our business and industrial automation strategy."

Reporting to Peter within the recently-formed Al Buiness Unit are managers Bill Frank and Chuck Piper.

With Data General for more than six years, Bill now is manager of Al Account Development. Previously, Bill worked in the North American Sales Division in different capacities including national account manager for E.F.Hutton and Branch Sales manager.

Bill has a total of 13 years experience in the computer business, and he has been president of a software consulting firm. He holds a BA in economics from the City College of New York.


