Moving In At 3400



Employees within the Distribution Division and the Industry Marketing group this week became the first to make the move to Data General's new facility at 3400 Computer Drive from 4400 Computer Drive. By the end of March, approximately 180 employees will be housed in the 80,000-square-foot building as employees within Marketing Communications, Americas/Far East (A/FE) and Latin American Operations move. By late spring, the Executive Briefing Center is scheduled to be completed. This area will be a showcase of Data General products and will provide meeting space for sales representatives and customers. The new facility will have a cafeteria, and a dining room for guests of the Briefing Center. New Facilities Focus On Future Business

Data General's commitment to international business was evident last week with the "official" opening of

new, larger, country-headquarters facilities in Melbourne, Australia, and Wellington, New Zealand. President Ed de Castro was on hand in both cities to mark the occasions and meet with employees.

The trip also provided Ed an opportunity to meet with customers and government representatives in order to discuss the company's products and future plans.

Data General-Australia's new headquarters occupies four floors of a five-story building. It houses about 150 employees who handle Sales, Systems Engineering, Marketing, Training, Administration and Field Engineering and Software Support functions. A Systems Division group also is located in the new facility.

During the opening of Data General-New Zealand's new headquarters, Ed told employees and members of the local business and trade press that "this new facility is a sign of Data General's growing presence in New Zealand. Our commitment to the country has never been higher. We've won some very important business here recently, including a major contract with the Department of Trade and Industry. As a matter of fact, our New Zealand business has quadrupled over the past four years."

Besides the country-headquarters, the facility in New Zealand houses Wellington branch Sales, Systems Engineering and Field Engineering offices, and a demonstration area where customers can view the latest Data General offerings.

Developers Key To Success

Data General's Training facility in Woodstock was home this week to software engineers from the Systems Development Division's (SDD) Operating Systems group.

Two days of presentations and workshops left employees with a sharp understanding the company's business strategies and product development goals, feedback on their products' performances from customers who attended the conference, and ideas on how to strengthen communications and team-building practices within their area.

The conference also provided the software developers with an outline of their roles in ensuring

Data General's success, thanks to Bob Miller, senior vice president of the Information Systems Group. During his presentation, Bob discussed the direction of the company's overall business strategy and how the software engineers fit in.

"I want you to understand that what we are doing -in fact, what we have been doing for several years -- is
following a strategy which positions Data General as a
major player in this industry," said Bob. "It is the critical
path to the future of Data General."

According to Bob, there are five essential steps in this path.

"The first step is to recognize the multi-vendor environment as a reality," stated Bob. "It would do Data General no long-term good to build our entire product line around a proprietary solution. The open systems architecture has become the cornerstone for differentiating Data General solutions. It puts the employees in Software Development in the critical position of developing solutions which can determine Data General's future."

Going hand-in-hand with an open systems architecture, said Bob, is the adherence to software standards -- both those recognized by the computer industry as a whole, and those which evolve as de facto standards.

"We want to give customers the freedom to choose from the best options available to them. That's the 'bottom line' in our accommodation of standards. Again, Software Development is critical to our success."

The third step is to give customers the ability to do all their computing from a single workstation -- to offer "seamless integration" of strategic applications so that the technology at work is transparent to the person using the system.

"Let's face it," stated Bob. "The vast majority of customers have no interest in systems which require users to write programs. They want the applications to be there for the individual user -- accessible through a menu that allows them to perform the functions they need in their daily work.

"We accomplished seamless integration with CEO comprehensive electronic office software, giving users easy access to spreadsheets, graphics and custom applications, while providing the essential elements of office automation.

"We're doing the same thing with TEO software, providing engineering functionality integrated with business applications and CEO mail capabilities.

"To say that such seamless integration is a major accomplishment for software developers is an understatement."

The fourth point in this path is to "build partnerships with companies that have the most desirable applications for the industries we are serving."

Finally, said Bob, "the clincher for Data General is to offer the lowest cost of ownership. We talk a lot about the lowest price/performance. Our company was founded on price/performance. That isn't going to change."

Bob closed his remarks by saying that "I believe we have the strategy to succeed in the longer term. It won't

be easy. It never is for the smaller company that is attempting to gain market share. We have to have better products. We have to have better services. We have to offer lower prices. We can succeed. And we will."

Musical Software

When Lloyd Altman began playing the cello at the age of 12, it may not have occurred to him then that he would be, "many years later," a software engineer at Data General. His background certainly points him in the opposite direction.

Since picking up the cello, Lloyd has accumulated a long list of musical credentials, which include a faculty position at both the Brooklyn College Conservatory and the Eastman School of Music. Lloyd has also been principal cellist and personnel manager for the Fairfield Chamber Orchestra. He holds bachlor's and master's degrees in music theory from Eastman. Lloyd's interest in software actually came about during his senior year at Eastman. At that time, Lloyd chose two programming courses to satisfy an elective requirement. From then on, it was love at first keystroke.

"Practicing a musical instrument and debugging a program are very similar. The discipline involved is the same. People who are musically gifted tend to take to computers very well," Lloyd says.

After completing his master's degree, Lloyd felt that he would like to pursue his interest in programming. As a result, in 1984 he took a computer class at Columbia University to see if he was still interested. He was, and took a few more courses, which he enjoyed even more. Lloyd then applied and was accepted into the master's program in computer science at Columbia's School of Engineering. While he earned his master's degree, he worked part-time as a programming comsultant. His new position at Data General is his first full-time computer-related position, and he loves it. Lloyd now works within the the Systems Development Division, and is responsible for enhancing current graphics products, particularly Trendview.

According to Lloyd, it has been a natural transition.

"I was ready to do this type of work," Lloyd says. "There is a certain feeling of satisfaction that comes with the amount of concentration needed for programming and development. That's the reason I'm here. It's quite a challenge."

Lloyd has not given up his music entirely. An album he recorded, with folk singer Linda Russell, was released in December. He also has plans to play for another recording session next month.

Software/Hardware At The Education Center

During the weeks of March 16 and March 23, Educational Services will offer four technical courses to Data General employees. All classes will be held at the Education Center, 2400 Computer Drive in Westboro.

- Introduction to MS-DOS (S145) is a two-day course that teaches how to use the features and functions of the MS-DOS operating system. Previous data processing experience is the prerequisite for this course, which begins on Monday, March 16.
- INFOS II Utilization & Design (S306) is designed for AOS and AOS/VS programmers, analysts, and system managers who have recent programming experience. This five-day course covers the organization and features of the INFOS II file management system. The course starts Monday, March 16.
- Computer Concepts (S100) is a three-day introduction to computer concepts and terminology. The course reviews computer architecture, software and components. Previous data processing experience is not required. Class begins on Monday, March 16.
- CEO Implementation Workshop (WK101) is designed for the CEO office manager who must develop a standardized user environment. Students will develop standards and procedures for a private user. User-level knowledge of CEO is the prerequisite for this course. This is a two-day session which starts Monday, March 23.

Savings And Investment Plan Update

Whether you are currently participating in the Savings and Investment Plan, or planning to enroll on April 1, you should be aware of recent modifications and upcoming plan deadlines.

GIC Rate - 10.15%:

1987 contributions to the Guaranteed Income Fund will be invested in a contract with the Metropolitan Insurance Company at an effective annual interest rate of 7.65 percent. However, since the 1987 contributions will be pooled with those from previous years, participants will actually receive a slightly higher rate of at least 10.15 percent.

Fund Transfers:

Participants in the Savings and Investment Plan can transfer all, or part, of their account balance from one investment fund to any other investment fund(s) at the start of any calendar quarter BUT not more than once every six months.

If you would like to transfer funds for the calendar quarter beginning April 1, you must complete the Fund Transfer portion of the Savings and Investment Enrollment/Change Form and return it to the Benefits department in Westboro no later than Friday, March 20. All transfers will become effective April 1.

The transfer of funds will not affect your future contributions. If your intention is to have all contributions after April 1 directed to a different fund(s) you must also complete the Investment Election portion of the form.

Enrollment/Change forms are available from your Human Resources representative or the Corporate Benefits department in Westboro.

Enrollment & Change Deadlines:

Friday, March 20 is the deadline for submitting all new enrollments and quarterly changes to the Savings and Investment Plan. The enrollment form (used for both new enrollments and changes) must be returned to your local Benefits department by March 20 for enrollments/changes effective April 1.

Plan Eligibility:

If you are a recently-hired employee at Data General, and will have completed 90 days of employment before April 1, you will be eligible to join the Savings and Investment Plan effective April 1.

A packet of descriptive material will be mailed to your home during the last week of February. If you do now receive this information, contact your Benefits administrator or Human Resources representative.

After reading the information, simply complete the enrollment form and submit it to your Benefits or Human

Resources representative. If you decide not to contribute to the program at this time, you will be able to enroll at the start of the next quarter in July.


