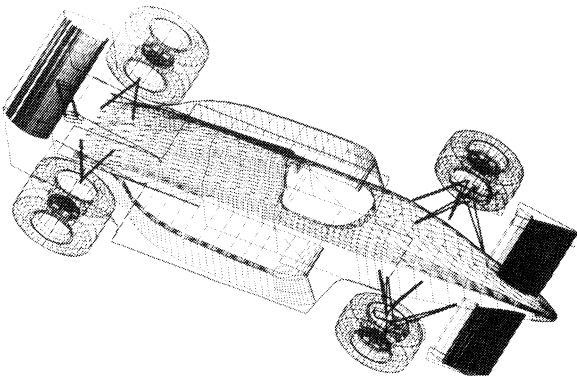
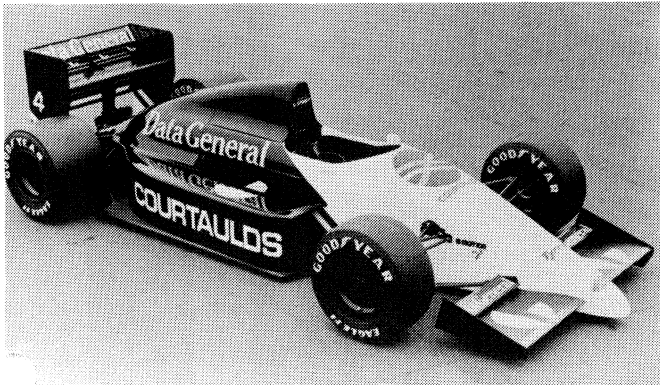

Formula 1 Car Has Data General Flavor



With the start of the 1987 Formula 1 race car series less than two weeks away, Data General-Europe will again be a major sponsor of a Tyrrell race car. Data General Team Tyrrell's car this season will have an edge that other Formula 1 race cars will be without. The car is the first Grand Prix race car to be totally designed with the aid of a computer. And that computer, of course, is a Data General system.

"The debut of the Data General Team Tyrrell car represents the first large scale results of the technological cooperation between Tyrrell and Data General," says Gordon Dennis, director of Marketing for Data General-Europe.

"Tyrrell's use of our advanced computer technology and communications represents the leading edge in Formula 1, and provides a dramatic case study of how

businesses successfully meet the challenges of the late 1980s and the next decade," says Gordon.

Data General and Team Tyrrell joined forces a year ago, when the company became a major sponsor of the racing syndicate. Besides appearances of Tyrrell leader Ken Tyrrell before Data General customers, that partnership calls for the car to be emblazoned with the Data General logo, prominently displayed last year before the millions of people around the world who viewed the Formula 1 races.

In addition, the sponsorship allows Data General Team Tyrrell to use Data General computers to design its car and analyze the car's performance.

Four Data General DS/7540 workstations were being used to design the 1987 car. Several DATA GENERAL/One portable computers also will be used this year for the racing series. While some of the computers will be used to measure performance of the car during test runs, others will be used for on-track analysis of the car's performance.

The high-tech design is being complemented by the use of the latest materials to help maximize the car's performance. Courtaulds, a British-based textiles, chemicals and industrial products group, which also is a sponsor of Data General Team Tyrrell, contributed advanced materials for use in the construction of the car.

The Club Meets In Jamaica

The best of Data General's Sales representatives over the past two years were honored for their sales efforts this week at the 15th Million Dollar Club. Last year's Club was cancelled due to poor business conditions.

In all, about 300 Sales representatives from around the world met in Jamaica for three days of meetings and workshops. The Club provided members with the information about Data General product and business strategies which will help them to successfully continue selling Data General computers.

In addition to talks from Data General's executives on the work taking place within the divisions they head up, attending Sales representatives had an opportunity

to meet Ken Tyrrell, founder of the Tyrrell Racing Organization.

For the past two years, Data General-Europe has been a major sponsor of Team Tyrrell, now known in racing circles as Data General Team Tyrrell. Ken took time from his busy schedule to address the Club members on Data General's involvement with Formula One racing. That partnership has resulted in Ken's use of Data General computers to design a Formula One race car and analyze the car's performance.

The Million Dollar Club also gave President Ed de Castro an opportunity to meet with the Sales representatives. In an address to Club members, Ed reflected on past Million Dollar Clubs and applauded the Sales representatives for their efforts.

Excellent Service Awards Conference Set For Montreal

For the seventh year, the best field engineers within North American Field Engineering (NAFE) will be recog-

nized for their outstanding contributions to the Field Engineering division. Approximately 350 field engineers and selected guests will gather in Montreal April 22 through April 25, for the Excellent Service Awards Conference. The agenda will include workshops, meetings, and, of course, an award ceremony, all to be held at the Le Centre Sheraton.

Field Engineering Brings Co-Op Students To Milford

Dave Fleming, John Depietro, Scott Gabelhart and Amy Adams are finding that experience is the best teacher. Dave, John, Scott and Amy are Northeastern University students, participating in the school's co-op program. This means that each semester in-class education is supplemented by several months of work experience in an area related to their field of study.

These four students are gaining valuable work experience at Data General's Field Engineering organization. Providing co-op students with an opportunity to "test the waters" is nothing new to Data General. In fact, since 1972, Data General has brought to the company dozens of co-op education students from schools throughout New England.

According to College Relations Representative Sally Radziewicz, any cooperative program serves as an excellent recruiting tool.

"The cooperative program enables Data General to maintain an infusion of new talent at entry-level positions while providing the students with work experience that is directly related to their major course of study," Sally says. "In addition, both the students and Data General can make an early assessment of each other for possible early employment following graduation."

Steve Hobbs, Corporate Employment manager, agrees wholeheartedly with Sally.

"The cooperative program benefits both the student and Data General," says Steve. "The student has the opportunity to get real work experience, and the chance to help pay for school. Data General, in turn, gets exposure to young people who are eager to learn the business. The program gives us a chance to show our support for the training of these people."

Sally and Steve realize that students' assessment of life in business can only come when they are hired into positions where they can make a genuine contribution to a company and be fully-challenged at the same time.

Dave is working in the Purchasing department in Milford, assisting the department on an as-needed basis. He also will be responsible for a purchasing project which will help to enhance operations within the department. John, Scott and Amy have been hired to work as assistants in the Planning department. They will be responsible for helping the department analyze and implement future courses of business.

Operations Analyst Recognized

Marie Rock's business experience helped her to contribute to a textbook used by business students at universities throughout the United States.

Marie, an operations analyst in Field Engineering's Plans and Controls department, co-authored a pair of business policy cases which will appear in the textbook, *Business Policy: Administrative, Strategic and Contingency Issues*. Each case describes the manner in which a company or organization should handle a business issue.

"It is the students' responsibility to analyze the situation presented in the case and decide what the threats and opportunities are, what the business would like to do, what it can do, and what it should do in both the short and long run," Marie says.

"The cases were selected for presentation at the annual meeting of the North American Case Research Association last November," Marie says. "The cases, which examine the North Urban Manpower Administration and the North Urban Private Industry Council, were chosen on the basis of being well-written and timely, and on the amount and method of research done for each case.

"After the presentation, I was notified that the cases were to be included in the textbook, which will be published in December."

Marie is currently working on two other research cases. One involves activities taking place at a candy company, the other looks at a large manufacturer.

Training

Courses Scheduled At Education Center

During the weeks of April 20 and 27, Educational Services will offer software and hardware courses to Data General employees. All classes will be held at the Education Center at 2400 Computer Drive in Westboro.

Software Courses

- **COBOL Programming with INFOS_II** (S107) is a five-day course that teaches how to write programs in ANSI '74 COBOL using INFOS_II. Topics include: screen section, SGU, SWAT debugger, ISAM, DBAM and selected utilities. AOS/VS User (S209) and COBOL programming experience are the prerequisites for this course. Class begins Monday, April 20.

- **(NEW) Hardware Concepts for Software Professionals** (S170) surveys the architectural arrangement and terminology of the ECLIPSE MV/Family computer systems. Topics include: CPU subsystems, power subsystems,

virtual memory management, I/O processing, I/O bus structures and SCPOS utility. The prerequisite for this course is recent data processing experience. This course begins Monday, April 27, and runs until Friday, May 1.

- *AOS/VS System Manager* (S219/VS) is a five-day course that teaches students new to AOS/VS system management how to install, generate, maintain and manage AOS/VS on an ECLIPSE MV/Family computer system. AOS/VS User(S209) or equivalent experience is the prerequisite for this course. Class starts Monday, April 27.

- *AOS/VS Enhancements-Revs 06 & 07* (SM504) is a two-day seminar that will help you gain in-depth knowledge of specific changes to AOS/VS and learn to use its newest features to improve the efficiency of your systems use and management. Class begins Monday, April 27.

Hardware Courses

- *AOS/VS for the Hardware Specialist* (H209) teaches the basics of the Data General AOS/VS operating system including system use, the Command Line Interpreter, startup, shutdown, monitoring and error recovery. Knowledge of data processing and hardware concepts is the prerequisite for this course. This course begins Monday, April 20.

- *Intro to Data General 32-Bit Computer Systems* (H100/MV) explains the terminology of virtual storage systems and introduces hardware design features to a functional, conceptual level. This class provides a complete systems perspective including an overview of mass storage devices, terminals, printers and communications. The prerequisite for this ten-day course is knowledge of general computer design concepts, digital circuitry and number conversions. This course is held from Monday, April 27 until Friday, May 8.

To enroll in any training program offered by Educational Services, call tie line 221, extension 1647. The prior approval of your supervisor is required for course registration.

Benefits

Medical Coverage May Continue

Effective immediately, the provisions of the Consolidated Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act (COBRA) now afford employees and their eligible dependents the opportunity to continue medical benefits beyond the date coverage would ordinarily cease.

The basic provisions of COBRA are:

- If your employment is terminated or your work week is reduced to a level where you are no longer eligible for benefits, you may continue coverage for up to 18 months.
- If you die or become divorced or legally separated, your dependents (spouse and children) may continue

coverage for up to 36 months.

- If your dependent child no longer meets the definition of dependent (reaches age 19 or 23 if a full time student), your dependent child may continue coverage for up to 36 months.

Under the new law, you or your qualified dependent have the responsibility to inform Data General of a divorce, legal separation, or a child losing dependent status. It is Data General's responsibility to contact you or your qualified dependent in the event of your death, termination of employment or reduction in work hours. Your election must be made within 60 days from the later of the date of the event or the date Data General notifies you of your right to continue coverage.

If you do not elect to continue coverage your medical benefits will end on the last day of the month in which you terminate. If you do elect to continue coverage, you will have coverage under the same provisions as the medical program provided to other employees. You will not be required to provide evidence of insurability, but you will be required to pay the entire monthly premium plus a two percent administration charge.

Similar continuation provisions are already in effect for the Data General Dental Plan, since October 1, 1986.

If your benefit coverage should be affected by any of the above events and you would like to continue your medical coverage, you should contact the Corporate Benefits department in Westboro for enrollment instructions and cost information.

Tee-Off Time For The Golf League

The Data General Golf League's 1987 season gets underway Monday, April 20, for practice and qualifying rounds, and Monday, May 11, for the start of league play.
