Data General Introduces Tape Management System

Data General has introduced the AOS/VS Tape Management System (TMS) for use with the ECLIPSE MV/Family of computer systems. TMS provides an efficient means of managing large tape libraries.

Targeted at customers with significant magnetic tape processing requirements, TMS offers a full range of control and reporting capabilities. This system automatically monitors and analyzes information such as tape creation date and retention cycles. As a result, users can implement procedures for tape maintenance, expiration, backup and restore programs. TMS is suited to users whose applications generate large numbers of tapes or require long tape retention periods.

According to Ed Connor, director of the Software Products and Services Group, "The AOS/VS Tape Management System represents a unique product offering for Data General computer users. TMS was developed in response to customer requirements for an fficient way to manage large tape facilities.

"The system is particularly effective for a full range of commercial and technical environments with massive record-keeping needs. Typical environments include large data processing centers, government agencies, manufacturing and process control, seismic analysis,

and automatic test equipment, " Ed says.

In addition, TMS features extensive security mechanisms designed to protect against accidental or inadvertent deletion of data, as well as access by unauthorized users. To maintain system security, TMS implements a set of software profiles that prevent unauthorized access to tape data. System managers can assign privileges, differentiating between general users and those with special privileges.

TMS features a centralized data base that can be accessed through remote systems. A unique networking scheme allows users to put the tape management system software on one ECLIPSE MV/Family system, but access TMS data bases by any of the other systems running TMS.

Data General's Software Products and Services Division offers a consulting service to help users install and implement AOS/VS TMS. This consulting service includes single site installation and setup, user and tape librarian review, as well as general assistance and guidance. Data General can also provide installation and setup for additional sites.

AOS/VS TMS is priced at \$15,000.

Miller Resigns; de Castro Assumes Acting Responsibility

Bob Miller has resigned from his position as senior vice president of the Information Systems Group to assume the duties of chairman and chief executive officer of MIPS Computer Systems of Sunnyvale, California.

Data General President Ed de Castro will assume management of the Information Systems Group on an acting basis. Data General intends to initiate a study to determine the best organizational structure to manage this portion of the company's business and may announce organization changes at a future time.

In making the announcement, Ed said, "Bob helped the company through some important transitions, and we wish him success in his new position."

David Fanning and producer Martin Smith earned the international television reporting award for the report. The program was chosen from a field of 500 print, radio and television entries. This is the second consecutive year Data General has underwritten FRONTLINE.

Data General Employees Help Students

Andy Limeri and Frank Ginac, software engineers within the Software Quality Assurance group, are back in school. Since February, they have been teaching students at Milford High School FORTRAN 77, a programming language. Twice a week, Andy and Frank spend two hours with the group of 12 students (and one computer science instructor), demonstrating the usage of the language, and answering questions.

"We wanted to teach the students the language as quickly as possible and then give them an opportunity to use it in practical applications," Frank says. "While our emphasis is on learning to use the language itself we also want the students to learn some of the ke elements of good software design and programming style."

The programming class is done strictly on a voluntary basis. The students neither get graded on their work, nor earn credit for the class. They come, after schoolhours, to learn.

"They're dedicated. Some have given up jobs and extracurricular activities just to be here," says Andy. "We compete with school sports, and students have to make that choice. These kids are here because they want to be."

The time Andy and Frank spend at Milford High School is complimented by a donation Data General made to the school a few years ago of an ECLIPSE S/140 computer system. The system is being used in teaching mathematics, science and business education courses, along with BASIC and PASCAL.

"Our intention, initially, was to teach the syntax of the language, and what the student would use FORTRAN 77 for," Frank says. "But now, we've moved away from that somewhat and have begun teaching design and programming. We want to stress a logical approach to programming. We've been able to introduce the basics of Data General systems, as well."

"I am very excited that we are able to offer such a class to our high school students," says Caryl Medske. Corporate Relations director of School Volunteers for Milford. "This is the first time we have had corporate volunteers in a classroom. We are looking forward to being able to offer this again next year."

Four Receive Director's Awards

May Is High Blood Pressure Month

During the first week, May 5 and 7, the time of the screening will be 8:30 a.m. until 11:30 a.m. and 1:00 p.m. until 4:00 p.m. The times for subsequent weeks will be announced at a later date.

Educational information is provided to each person screened. Employees with elevated readings will receive one-on-one education about high blood pressure and life-style risk factors and treatment, and will be rescreened one month later.

More than 54 million people have high blood pressure and 30 percent of those people do not know it. Because high blood pressure has no symptoms, the only way to find out if you have it is to have your pressure checked.

How are the orders processed?

Information from the order forms is entered into a data processing system. This system verifies the badge number and the employee name; records the outing selected, and number and type of tickets ordered; and tallies attendance at each outing.

Are outing tickets the same?

No, different tickets are needed for spouse/guest, dependent children 12 and over, dependent children ages 3-11, and dependent children, age 2 and under.

Dividing tickets into categories provides the information needed to assure proper quantities of food.

What are the beverage arrangements?

Various types of beverage(s) will be available at all outings. These may include soda, lemonade, iced tea or punch. No alcoholic beverages are provided. Cash bars are available at some outings.

How about food?

Due to the advance publication of this brochure some menus might change slightly. Every effort has been made to provide you with the most accurate information available.

At the amusement parks, are the rides unlimited? Are there any restrictions?

Training

Education Center Course Update

During the month of May, Educational Services will offer several software and hardware courses to Data General employees. All classes will be held at the Education Center, 2400 Computer Drive in Westboro.

Software

- PRESENT through CLI (S142) This comprehensive two-day course teaches how to create and use queries through CLI to select information from data sources and format this information into reports and charts. Participants should be familiar with the AOS/VS operating system. Class begins Thursday, May 7.
- Introduction to CEO Mail and Calender (OA143) Participants will learn how to effectively use the features of CEO electronic mail and calender, including telephone messaging and "tickler" files. This course is a valuable learning tool for all clerical, secretarial, and support employees who need to use these CEO facilities. This one-day class is being offered Wednesday, May 13.
- CEO List Processing (OA147) A complete one-day course on how to use the CEO merge function for mass mailings and repetitive documents with special emphasis on select and sort features. Participants should be experienced with CEO word processing. This class will be held Tuesday, May 5.

Recovery Workshop: Techniques for System Crisis Management (WK100) - This course explains how to define and formulate a disaster/recovery plan for your system. Participants will learn how to set objectives and weigh options for implementing the right type of plan for their system. This two-day course starts Monday, May 11

• AOS/VS Operator Training (SH109VS) - This class teaches the effective day-to-day operation of a Data General AOS/VS-based system. Topics covered include system startup, shutdown, monitoring and error recovery. This five-day course begins Monday, May 11.

- 6026 Magnetic Tape Drive Field Maintenance (H223) Participants will learn how to operate and maintain the 6026 series magnetic tape drive subsystems. You will learn how to load, run, and interpret the appropriate diagnostics and how to use the alignment and adjustment procedures. Mag tape format, dual mode tape controller, and tape programming are also covered. This three-day course starts on Monday, May 11.
- ECLIPSE MV/10000 Field Maintenance (H168) This five-day course provides a functional, board-level overview of the ECLIPSE MV/10000 computer.
