New DATA GENERAL/One Service Offered

Employees in Westboro, Southboro and Milford who use DATA GENERAL/One Model 1 or Model 2 portable computers can now have expired batteries in the computers replaced in Westboro for a minimal fee. Rather than ship the system to the Product Repair Center (PRC) in Fountain, Colorado, employees can bring it to the Field Engineering branch in Westboro at Mail Stop D124.

Each DATA GENERAL/One unit with an LCD screen has a lithium and a nickel-cadmium battery. The batteries have a life of two to three years. Because of the complexity involved and electro-static discharge considrations, replacement of the lithium battery in the Model 1 computer and the nickel-cadmium battery in the Model 2 computer must be done by a Field Engineering specialist. All batteries in the recently-announced DATA GENERAL/One Model 2T computer can be replaced by the user.

Users with company- or employee-owned Model 1 or Model 2 systems that require new batteries should call 1-800-DG-HELPS to schedule a time to deliver the unit. Drop-off times will be from 9 to 11 a.m. daily. Units may not be mailed to the branch.

North American users requiring service other than battery replacement should phone 1-800-DG-HELPS and then send their units to the PRC at 702 Frontage Road, Fountain, Colorado, 80817. The PRC also will continue to accept DATA GENERAL/One computers for battery replacement/head cleaning service.

Consultants From Italy Spend Week With Data General

A group of 20 computer industry consultants from Italy are now "experts" on office automation, following a week-long tour of Data General and visits to several f its customers. The Studio Organizatio De Industralie (SOI) each year chooses a high technology company with which to spend a week, meeting with both company executives and customers. This year, SOI reviewed operations at Data General.

"In the past, SOI met with IBM and Digital Equipment. We were pleased to have the opportunity to host the group this year, and show them what Data General is all about," says Janice Levenson, Marketing consultant within the Corporate Conference Center.

During its visit to Westboro last month, the group was given several product demonstrations. Members were extremely interested in CEO comprehensive electronic office software, CEO Voice, and PC*I, Data General's strategy to link IBM and IBM-compatible computers to Data General systems.

"The group was able to learn a great deal about Data General, thanks to the many demonstrations and presentations. They provided the group with a well-rounded picture of the company," Janice says.

The group concluded its day in Massachusetts with a presentation given by Andria Rossi, of Rossi Consultants, who addressed the visitors on the future of office automation.

The rest of SOI's week was spent at Data General customer locations.

SOI began its U.S. tour in Chicago, visiting with Premark. Premark is one of the largest users of CEO software in the midwest. It has been using CEO for the last three years on a variety of Data General systems. The firm is also a large user of Lexis and Nexis information services which can be accessed via DG/Gate.

Following its tour of the Premark facility, the SOI group paid a visit to the offices of the City of Chicago. The city government currently operates six Data General ECLIPSE MV/Family computer systems, which are used in a variety of applications. The Department of Inspectional Services uses an ECLIPSE MV/Family computer to automate the legal process for the courts and their dockets. The Department of Health is automating its vital records. They can communicate with more than 400 clinics within the city, in an effort to update birth and death records, for example. This is done through the use of CEO and some COBOL applications which run in the CEO environment.

The third stop on the group's tour was Pittsburgh, where it met with executives at Westinghouse. Westinghouse is currently using 21 ECLIPSE MV/Family computer systems in its artificial intelligence group, the Plant

Engineering department, and in the Service and Engineering group.

Following that stop, SOI spent some time with members of the Employee Relations Office of the State of New York in Albany. It is currently using a wide range of Data General computers, from the ECLIPSE MV/10000 computer to the ECLIPSE MV/2000 DC system to handle administrative chores. In addition, these systems are able to share data with IBM systems. The ECLIPSE MV/Family systems support more than 100 users who are using IBM PCs and DASHER workstations. While on the road, the employees use DATA GENERAL/One computers.

The last stop on the trip was the Federal Reserve Bank in New York. The bank helped to test PC*I before the product had been announced. It is currently using a Data General system to integrate IBM PCs and DASHER 286 workstations.

Users Group Conference Plans Are Underway

The 1987 Conference of the North American Data General Users Group (NADGUG) will be held October 19-22 at the Tropicana Hotel in Las Vegas.

Conference attendees will be able to choose from management, technical and end-user sessions, as well as Educational Services seminars, roundtables, exhibits and informal get-togethers. The conference, which is expected to draw more than 800 people, will provide an excellent opportunity for users of Data General systems to discuss their systems' applications.

Benefits

New Stock Purchase Period Begins August 1

Employees who work at least 20 hours a week and have one year of service on August 1 are eligible to have a specific dollar amount deducted from their paycheck each week to purchase Data General stock. The amount of the deduction can be as low as \$5 or as high as 10 percent of your basic earnings on the first day of the period. The stock will be purchased at 85 percent of the average market price on the first or last day of the payment period, whichever is lower. The new payment period will extend from August 1 to January 30, 1988.

If you are currently participating in the plan and wish to make a change for the period beginning August 1, you can obtain the necessary form from your Human Resources representative or your local Benefits department.

Employees who receive sales commissions are reminded that the 10 percent maximum they can contribute to the program is based on their benefit salary, not their base pay.

Also, all employees are reminded that when they receive an increase in pay the percentage of their contribution does not automatically increase to reflect the pay raise. They must submit a new Authorization form specifying the amount they would like to contribute.

New participants or those making changes must complete an Authorization form and return it to the Benefits department no later than Friday, July 17.

The Stock Purchase Plan is explained in a prospectus and a Stock Plan booklet available through your local Benefits administrator or the Corporate Benefits department in Westboro.

Training

Educational Services is offering the following hardware and software courses for Data General employees in July and August.

- The AOS/VS Colloquium This one-time-only seminar will provide AOS/VS system managers, programmers and designers with valuable understanding of important aspects of AOS/VS architecture. Topics to be covered include: Multi-Processors, Memory Management System, New File System, and Terminal Services. This three-day colloquium begins on Monday, July 27.
- ECLIPSE MV/Family Assembly Language Programming (\$105/VS) Employees enrolled in this course will learn how to write, assemble, execute, and debug programs using the Data General ECLIPSE MV/Family assembly language and utilities. The prerequisites of \$209 (AOS and AOS/VS User) and assembly language programming experience are needed to attend this five-day class which begins on Monday, July 27.
- Programming in PL/1 (SM506) This seminar teaches programming in PL/1 using Data General's implementation of this language under AOS/VS. Employees must have taken an AOS/VS course, or have a working knowledge of CLI and an AOS/VS text editor, and programming experience in a high-level language. This three-day class starts on Monday, July 27.
- Fundamentals of COBOL Programming (S110) This course is geared toward experienced programmers who need COBOL training for more advanced COBOL courses. It introduces the principles, conventions, and programming techniques of the COBOL language. Programming experience is needed to attend this five-day class beginning on Monday, July 27.
- AOS/VS for the Hardware Specialist (H209) Employees familiar with data processing and hardware concepts will learn the basics of the AOS/VS operating system, including system use, the Command Line Interpreter (CLI), start-up and shut-down, monitoring and error recovery. This five-day class starts on Monday, July 27.
- Introduction to Data General 16-Bit Computer Systems (H100) This hardware maintenance course teaches the Data General basic instruction set, standard and virtual console operations, and I/O operations. It also provides an overview of Data General mass storage devices, as well as Data General communications terminology. A knowledge of circuitry, number conversions, Boolean concepts and oscilloscope usage is needed to attend this ten-day class, which begins on Monday, August 3.
- 6236/6237 Disc Field Maintenance (H236) Designed for computer maintenance technicians, this course teaches how to load and run diagnostics and perform FRU-level maintenance on the Data General 6236/6237 disc. The prerequisite of H100 or H100/MV (Data General 16-Bit or 32-Bit computer systems) is required for this three-day class, which starts Monday, July 27.

Prior approval of your supervisor is required for course registration. Call (tie-line) 221-1647 to enroll in these or other classes. All classes will be held at the Education Center at 2400 Computer Drive in Westboro.
