New Zealand Government Purchases CEO System

The New Zealand Department of Internal Affairs has awarded Data General a \$3.4 million contract as part of an information systems network linking computer systems from Data General, IBM and Digital Equipment.

A key component of the contract is Data General's CEO comprehensive electronic office software. CEO will be used by the 95 elected-members of Parliament as well as the Prime Minister.

The contract was awarded to Data General's New Zealand subsidiary following a study which was completed in late 1986. The study concluded that a distribut-

office automation system would provide the best security features, avoid the overhead of a large centralized system, and meet the need for autonomy and control. Data General beat out ten competitors including two other finalists, Wang and Digital Equipment.

Initially, 33 ECLIPSE MV/2000 DC computer systems and 238 terminals will be installed in various locations including the Executive Wing of Parliament and the Parliamentary Library. Each system will include the CEO software, and some will have CEO decision support and videotext facilities. Four additional ECLIPSE MV/2000 DC computer systems will be used to access geographically dispersed computers using SN0 and X.25 connections.

Later this year, 71 DASHER/286 personal computers and laser printers will be installed for members of Parliament. These systems will use CEOwrite word processing and will be linked to the ECLIPSE MV/Family systems using CEO Connection. In addition, the PCs will be able to access the 802.3 network through a private branch exchange (PABX).

Data General will support a fully-equipped and staffed training facility in the Parliament building. During the first six months of operation, users will be trained in all aspects of CEO and in access of other computers and data bases. Individual training will be implemented for a Prime Minister. Ministers and Under-Secretaries.

Al Development Tools Available Through Data General

Data General has announced several artificial intelligence (AI) products resulting from a unique development and marketing agreement with Gold Hill Computers. Through the agreement, a variety of Gold Hill software products will be available for use on the DASHER/286 workstation, or personal computers (PCs) incorporated into networks managed by the recently-announced DG/PC*I.

"The Data General and Gold Hill relationship makes available the only combination of network-based, expert systems and LISP applications on PCs," says Stan Curtis, Gold Hill vice-president and co-founder. "Data General is the only computer vendor with which Gold Hill has an agreement of this depth."

Data General will market and support versions of the Gold Hill GoldWorks, GCLISP 286 Developer, and Golden Connection. Data General also completed an independent hardware vendor (IHV) agreement with Gold Hill for the 386 HummingBoard. Data General will recommend the 386 HummingBoard to customers seeking additional processing power for the DASHER/286 workstation or for PCs managed by DG/PC*I.

GoldWorks is an expert-system development and delivery environment for Intel 80286- and 80386-based personal computers. It is the first PC-based tool to offer the same power and functionality as high-end expert systems tools without requiring specialized AI workstations.

The 386 HummingBoard is a 386-based printed circuit board with memory designed to run in DASHER/286, IBM PC-XT and PC-AT class personal computers. Designed specifically to improve performance of Gold Hill AI related products, it comes with six MB to 24 MB of on-board memory. Data General and Gold Hill will market the 386 HummingBoard, and Gold Hill will and support it.

"We feel Gold Hill's approach to AI is a perfect fit for our commercial and office automation customers, and their strategy fits equally well with our vertical marketing efforts," says Dave Lyons, vice president of Group Marketing. "This agreement expands Data General offerings in seven targeted markets -- insurance, banking, brokerage, health, manufacturing, government and education."

The Data General price for GoldWorks is \$7500; GCLISP 286 Developer is \$1995; and Golden Connection is \$2,500. 386 HummingBoard prices are available from Gold Hill. These products are available 120 days after receipt of order.

IMG Implements New Strategy

Colin Crook, senior vice president of the Communications Systems Group (CSG), recently called on all Information Management Group (IMG) employees to "join together, as a group" so that they may "continue to make great progress in supporting Data General's information systems requirements."

Colin's remarks kicked off a recent IMG-wide meeting, at which he discussed IMG's mission, its future, and how IMG fits into the vision of CSG and Data General. Each of the IMG directors presented the significant accomplishments of their divisions that have contributed to the development of the IMG strategy and supported the business activities of their users.

The meeting was held to communicate IMG's business strategy, and to continue to build "a shared vision" of the group's mission and role in Data General. More than 250 IMG employees attended the conference, "Implementing the IMG Strategy."

"It is very important that the employees within IMG maintain a very strong common identity, and that we have a real understanding of our common goal of providing and maintaining a flow of information throughout the company," Colin said.

That goal is reached, according to Colin, by maintaining a fine balance between what IMG is asked to deliver and what resources the group has.

"The market is changing dramatically. We're moving toward more and more information systems. We need information systems to run the company effectively," said Colin.

Consolidation

Part of the IMG strategy has been to consolidate the data centers in Westboro. This consolidation is expected to reduce the actual number of machines, while increasing the service level IMG employees will be able to provide.

"IMG has undertaken the consolidation of the data centers in Marketing, Manufacturing, Finance, Advanced Manufacturing and Data Systems and Communications," says Kevin Mallett, Westboro Facilities manager within IMG's Facilities and Operations group. "This physical regrouping of resources will decrease necessary floor space, as well as operating expenses, while allowing us to offer an increased level of service to IMG users."

In addition, in an effort to improve operational efficiency, IMG is upgrading standard documentation, reporting and scheduling, along with standard operating procedures for all IMG data centers.

Employee Recognition

It was also announced at the meeting that IMG is establishing various employee recognition programs. According to Jagdish Dalal, director of the Information Center, Technology and Control Division (ICTCD) within IMG, these programs will enhance communication, increase recognition for employee accomplishments and generate a "group" identity.

Speaking on behalf of all IMG directors, Jagdish stressed that the message of the recognition programs and the meeting, was that IMG employees should be proud of their accomplishments.

"The past year has been tough, at times, but we have all pulled together to meet the challenges of business," Jagdish said. "We want to increase the awareness of our accomplishments."

Three types of awards will be given to employees: a Director's Award, which will be presented on a division basis; a Director's Lunch, which will provide two employees an opportunity to meet informally with directors each quarter; and a Team Award, which will encourage team building within IMG, and recognize the efforts of teams of employees.

Corporate Meeting Planning Has Award-Winning Employee

Data General's Alicia Rodriguez has the energy of several people. She has to, in order to perform her job. She is a meeting planner within the Corporate Meeting Planning department in Westboro. For the position one has to have fine-tuned people skills, an acute attention to detail, and an incredible sense of organization.

When planning a meeting for Data General, whether it is for a small department or a division of 1,000, people listen to Alicia. Recently, she was awarded the Meeting Planner of the Year award, which is presented by Meeting Planners International (MPI), an organization in which Alicia is heavily involved. Her coworkers, Manager Alan Kawadler, along with Meeting Planners Karen Horst and Marie Nardi, are also members of MPI.

The MPI award focuses on an individual's professional and civic involvement, technical skills, innovation, creativity, development of professionalism and his or her contributions to the meeting industry.

Individuals are first nominated for the award by their particular chapter, and if they wish to be considered further, must fill out a questionnaire. The awards committee then rates nominees on a point system, based on the quality of their answers.

As a member of MPI, Alicia has taught several courses on meeting management and has written a number of articles which deal with the various aspects of meeting planning. She says that the organization has been a great benefit for her professionally.

"I can apply everything I learn through MPI to my job here at Data General. I have the opportunity to meet other people in the meeting industry, as well as learn news ways to present and implement cost-effective event planning. My involvement is invaluable."

Corporate Meeting Planning

Corporate Travel and Meeting Services, based in Westboro, incorporates the Corporate Meeting Planning department and Corporate Travel. The group handles every aspect of meetings and special events, from hotel

negotiations to budget reconciliations. It is not responsible for meeting content, however.

"The group handles budgeting and negotiating, as well as site selection," Alicia says. "We help the sponsoring department with budgeting and planning the event. Our department negotiates contracts and actually executes the meeting on site when necessary. We are available for consultation on any aspect of an event or meeting."

According to Alicia, the Meeting Planning group serves a valuable purpose to Data General employees.

"We have the networking resources that individuals do not possess. In most cases we are negotiating with high levels of industry management from directors of Sales and general managers to regional directors and vice presidents of a given hotel property or chain. Because of the high volume of business we do, we also have serious negotiating power, and can command better transportation and accommodation rates. We're here for the employees, to save them time and money when planning events."

The Meeting Planning group is responsible for organizing the Million Dollar Club trip, the Field Engineering Awards Conference and the Ten Year Service Award trip, to name a few of its larger projects.

"Between the four of us, we have many years of experience to offer employees," Alicia says. "We have the knowledge and access to resources which allow us to be able to handle anything, from the very small to the very large."

Corporate Library Has Information For All Needs

Data General's Corporate Library in Westboro has a large collection of trade magazines, newspapers and books to serve the information needs of employees in a high technology environment. As employees need more and more information to accomplish their job challenges, however, the library is harnessing new ways to address those needs.

"Our goal is to help every employee meet his or her own information requirements," says Marjorie Schreier, Corporate Library supervisor. "We strive to be perceived as an active service organization, and not simply a storeroom for books."

The library staff determines the best strategy for obtaining information employees may need. According to Marjorie, when an employee begins to look for information, the best place to start is with one of the librarians on staff. They are trained to direct employees to the right resource or resources.

The Corporate Library has access to information generated from dozens of outside sources, such as Dialog Information Services, Mead Data Central, Viewtext, and the most recent addition, Videolog. The information available from these sources ranges from business and industry analyses to scientific and technical research.

"Through the use of DG Gate, a terminal emulator, we can access commercial databases for literature and information searches. The library can either send an employee a hard copy printout of the information requested, or can send the same information electronically, using CEO," says Marjorie.

"This capability provides employees with greater flexibility. They can manipulate the search results to fit their own particular needs. The automated search is just another way we can further help employees find what they need."

Some time ago, the Corporate Library in Westboro joined forces with the library staffs in Southboro and Milford to develop a union list of serials. In other words, the list pools together all past and current periodical holdings of the libraries into a single document. This allows employees to more readily find what is available within Data General's libraries, be it a newspaper, magazine, trade press or professional society publication.

In another cooperative effort, the staffs of the library facilities in the three Massachusetts' locations, created a combined listing of the company's holdings of industry and military standards. Using CEO data tables, each standard is listed by the sponsoring organization and number.

"Through our combined efforts, we can better serve the employees," Marjorie says. "Libraries are changing dynamically, and we have been able to stay abreast of the automation services. Librarians are the information specialists, the on-line experts. Our job, then, is to get that information to employees."

The Corporate Library is located in Building 14A, at Mail Stop C236. The library is open from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. For further information, call extension 5825, or just stop by.

- Free SORT/MERGE CBT Training Educational Technologies will test a new computer-based training course for three days starting on Wednesday, August 26. This course teaches how to use the SORT/MERGE Utility on sequential and INFOS files to sort and copy records; merge multiple files into a single file; delete records according to conditions and write these records to other files; edit record fields, and more. The prerequisites are a working knowledge of the SED editor and sequential files or INFOS files, programming experience and an AOS and AOS/VS User course. If you would like to get free training in exchange for your feedback on the course, please contact Lillian Cochran at 221-1548 or on CEO via host system Zeta.
- ECLIPSE MV/2000 DC Field Level Maintenance (H118) Learn how to install, verify functionality, maintain and diagnose the ECLIPSE MV/2000 DC system. Includes diagnostics coverage, loading of microcode, software backup and restoration procedures. It would be helpful for attendees to have some computer maintenance experience for this five-day class which begins on Monday, August 10.
- DASHER D2XX, D4XX Field Maintenance (H221) This course teaches how to maintain the DASHER D100 D200, D210, D211, D410 and D460 terminals to the Field Replaceable Unit (FRU) level through proper troubleshooting techniques, diagnostics and documentation. Employees who have taken H100 or H100/MV (Intro to Data General's 16-bit or 32-bit computer systems) are eligible for this three-day course which begins on Monday, August 10.
- AOS/VS Operator Training (SH109/VS) AOS/VS system operators will learn effective operation of Data General's AOS/VS-based system which includes startup, shutdown, monitoring, creating macros, error recovery and communicating with the operating system using CLI. Employees who have taken S100 (Computer Concepts) or have a functional knowledge of computer concepts are eligible for this five-day course which starts on Monday, August 10.
- *DG/SQL Utilization and Design (S317)* For AOS/VS system users only, this course teaches working knowledge of Data General's non-procedural, SQL-based, full implementation of the relational model database management system which is supported under AOS/VS on the ECLIPSE MV/Family of 32-bit computers. Interested employees should have taken S209 (AOS/VS User) and have a working knowledge of database concepts. This five-day class begins on Monday, August 3.
- XODIAC Internal Structures (SM431) Analysts, designers, programmers and support engineers who work with XODIAC network systems will want to take this

seminar. It presents an in-depth look at the workings of the XODIAC network management system. Topics include X.25 internals, methods of implementing user applications that require network resources, writing XODIAC agents, and much more. The prerequisites are 3309 (AOS System Programming) or S309/VS (AOS/VS System Programming, Part 1). Knowledge of the concepts and facilities of XODIAC is assumed. This five-day seminar begins on Monday, August 10.

- Diagnostic Operating System User (H101) This course teaches how to use Data General's diagnostics to effectively troubleshoot Data General processors. Participants should have a knowledge of Data General's 16-bit and 32-bit computer systems to attend this three-day course which begins on Wednesday, August 12.
- The AOS/VS Colloquium This one-time-only seminar will provide AOS/VS system managers, programmers and designers with valuable understanding of important aspects of AOS/VS architecture. The discussions will be presented by Data General's AOS/VS Development Team. Topics to be covered include: Multi-Processors -- the philosophy of Data General's implementation of multi-processors in the ECLIPSE MV/20000 Model 2; Memory Management System -- how this system can best be used in the design of applications and how Data General applications use memory management features; the New File System -- covers the functionality of revision 8 designed to enhance reliability of disk-based systems, and the best ways to convert from old to new systems: Terminal Services -- covers facilities provided. performance of the current PMGR and related hardware and software, and the new philosophies for handling large multi-terminal systems. This colloquium is being held at the Sheraton Milford Hotel starting on Monday, July 27.
