CEO Forms Base West German OA Network

The Interior Department of the West German State of Baden-Wurttemberg and its regional boards will automate their offices by purchasing \$11 million in equipment from Mannesmann Kienzle, a Data General OEM (original equipment manufacturer).

The state will equip its offices with 1740 computer workstations running CEO comprehensive electronic office software. The entire range of Data General's 32-bit systems will be installed, from the ECLIPSE MV/2000 DC departmental system to the ECLIPSE MV/20000 high-end supermini. The systems will be nnected via an Ethernet local area network based on are latest fiber optics technology.

This is one of the largest office automation projects to be carried out in Europe. The decision to purchase the equipment follows several months of test installations in which other computer manufacturers were involved.

Fiscal 1988 Kicks Off With Open House

All employees from Westboro, Southboro and Milford their families are invited to help kick off the start of fiscal 1988 with an open house to be held on Saturday, October 10 in Westboro.

On that day, Data General-Westboro will be transformed into a place that will give you and your family a view of Data General which you have never seen before. It is the first time an open house has ever been held in Westboro.

Employees and their guests will be able to tour the company's product development and manufacturing testing laboratories, the Information Resource Center and the new Executive Briefing Center.

This marks the first time the laboratories have ever been opened for general viewing. They normally are "off limits" to anyone other than those employees who work there because of the proprietary nature of the work that goes on there.

Even though the Executive Briefing Center opened several weeks ago, October 10 will be the first time employees will be invited to go through the EBC. The tour of the 3400 Computer Drive facility will provide you with a glimpse of what it is like to be a customer purchasing a Data General product.

Together, the tours in both buildings will provide you and your family with information on how Data General computers are developed, their markets and their applications.

A good deal of the day's events will take place outside. The areas adjacent to Buildings 14A and 14B will be turned into a street festival. Bands and some of the most talented "street" performers from Quincy Market will entertain you throughout the afternoon.

The visitors' parking circle in front of the lobby of Building 14A will be reserved for food. Here, hot and cold foods will be available along with soft drinks and ice cream all day long.

So, mark October 10 on your calendar and plan on coming to Westboro. In the event of rain, all outdoor events will be moved inside.

What's In A Tour?

Do you know how computers are developed? If not, then on October 10 you can find out.

From 10:00 a.m to 4:00 p.m., tours of development and manufacturing laboratories in Buildings 14A and 14B will be conducted. During the guided tours.

engineers, programmers and technicians will show you their work areas and describe their responsibilities.

The tours will give you a first-hand view of the technologies and processes used to bring Data General products to market -- from the design of a single-board CPU for the ECLIPSE MV/20000 computer to the development of CEO comprehensive electronic office and TEO/Electronics software.

Tours of the laboratories will begin at 10:00 a.m. Each tour will last about one hour. Upon completion of the tours, you will be presented with a copy of "A Year In Development," a 106-page brochure describing the recent development efforts of employees in Westboro and Research Triangle Park.

Once you have finished viewing the laboratories, you will want to walk next door to 3400 Computer Drive to view the new Executive Briefing Center. Besides conference rooms which host customers interested in purchasing Data General equipment, the center is loaded with the hardware and software products which you saw being developed earlier.

While in the center, Marketing employees will describe the products, their markets and applications. You will also view areas set aside to describe the company's history, as well as videotapes of customers discussing the benefits their firms have reaped since installing Data General products.

These tours mark the first time employees have ever been invited to view either the laboratories or the Executive Briefing Center. It is a glimpse of the computer industry which you should not miss.

At the same time, the Information Resource Center (IRC) in Building 14A will be open to show off its wares. The IRC, which opened about a year and a half ago, offers a wide range of software and hardware tools that allows employees to manage and support their decision-making activities. Throughout Data General's open house, the IRC staff will help employees and their families make use of the center's resources.

Try For A Computer

Just for coming to the Data General open house, you will be eligible to walk away with a DATA GENERAL/One computer. In all, 100 DATA GENERAL/One Model 1 computers will be awarded to lucky employees during the afternoon.

To be eligible to receive a system, simply return the RSVP card which can be found in this newsletter. On the afternoon of October 10, 100 RSVP cards will be randomly selected. Employees whose cards are selected will be notified that they can pick up a DATA GENERAL/One computer, along with a printer, and a hard carrying case before heading for home.

Remember, to be eligible to receive a computer, you must be present at the open house.

Winners should note that the gift will be subject to normal payroll taxes based on the approximate fair market value of the computer.

For The Kids

The Data General open house is not only for employees but for their entire families, as well. So, if you are worried about what to do with the kids, fear not. A number of entertainers from the area will be on hand keep kids of all ages occupied.

Throughout the day, children will be able to enjoy a puppeteer, mime, face painter, clowns, caricaturist and others to keep them entertained. They will be located throughout the grounds of 4400 Computer Drive, just looking for an audience.

Among those who will be at Data General are Tony Lupo, a hurdy-gurdy man who performs along with a monkey, and Rob Salafia, a Faneuil Hall mime. So you do not go home empty-handed, Neal Portnoy will be drawing caricatures. Neal is no stranger to Data General. He has appeared at several Million Dollar Club conferences, always attracting large audiences. In addition, representatives from the New England Science Center will be on hand to give presentations on advances in high technology.

Attention All Music Lovers

During Data General's open house, the grass areas surrounding 4400 Computer Drive will be turned into a theater where some of the area's most popular bands will perform.

John Lincoln Wright and the Sour Mash Revue will kick off the day's entertainment when they take to stage at 11:00 a.m. Many of you may be familiar with this country/blue grass band. They have performed in the area for quite some time. Their show will last until about 1:00 p.m.

The sounds of be-bop and jazz will then take over at about 2:00 p.m. when the Bob Brenner Swingtet takes the stage. The band plays a repertoire of hits from the 40s to the 80s. This swing band will play until 4:00 p.m.

Data General Employees Raise Consciousness

Field Engineering Offers A Communication Outlet

A new program in Field Engineering has employees talking.

Direct Line, a confidential communications program, allows Field Engineering employees to submit questions, issues and concerns which relate to the company, the division, or their own job and working environment. According to Jane Braley, the program's coordinator, Direct Line encourages communication among employees. Jane is responsible for receiving all submissions, directing the question or suggestion to the appropriate vice president or director, and tracking responses.

"Anyone can ask any question, in strict confidence," Jane says. "An employee may want to make a suggestion about a certain procedure or policy, and may not initially want to go directly to his or her manager. Direct Line opens up the lines of communication, and makes it easier to find the answers."

The program works like this: employees can submit a question or concern to Jane by completing the forms which can be found in Milford and offices throughout the field. They may then mail the forms to Jane at Mail Stop M-333 in Milford. Recently, it has become possible for employees also to submit suggestions via the CEO comprehensive electronic office system. The CEO address is DIRECT_LINE:FE1Z10.

Jane then determines who may best be able to address the particular question or issue. An employee using the program may receive a confidential response from Jane, or may be contacted directly by that executive most qualified to respond, if the employee requests an open response. An employee wishing to remain anonymous may also receive a response through Jane. Those submitting queries to Direct Line can now expect responses within two weeks in most cases.

"Direct Line is another way to show employees that Data General cares, and is concerned. This program gives vice presidents and directors a good indication of where those concerns lie, and allows them to act upon those concerns in a timely fashion," Jane says.

"Direct Line encourages communication," Jane say of the program which was introduced last February. "There is no limitation to the inquiries. We want employees to feel comfortable voicing any opinion, or asking any question. It's their program."

The Man Behind The Mike

Each week, for two hours, employees may attend a "HELP Yourself" class that will help them help themselves in finding fast resolutions to certain problems they may have while working with a computer. According to Julie Catullo, a trainer within IMG, the program was tablished to allow employees to be more independent. The class also was designed to reduce the number of calls the HELP desk receives.

The HELP class covers the following topics: trouble shooting your terminal, changing your password, capacity log-on messages, restoring CEO documents from the CEO wastebasket, printing inventories with pathnames, commonly-received error messages and their meanings, printing problems (hardware and software) and creating user-defined commands.

New Expense Report Effective Soon

Effective Monday, September 28, a new bi-weekly expense report will be introduced within Data General.

The new expense report will be a major convenience to frequent travelers because two weeks' worth of expenses may now be included on one expense report. If you choose to do so, employees may still submit their expenses on a weekly basis on the new expense report.

In addition to carrying two weeks' worth of expense information, the new expense report will assist Data General in reporting required meal and business meeting data to the Internal Revenue Service (IRS). A subtotal field has been added to sum business and meal expenses for ease of data entry. Your assistance in completing this information on the new expense report will help Data General comply with the IRS reporting requirements and expedite the processing of your expense reports.

Savings And Investment Plan Deadline Is Today

Today, September 18, is the deadline for submitting all new enrollments and quarterly contribution changes to the Savings and Investment Plan. The enrollment forms (used for new enrollments, changes and fund transfers) must be returned to your local Benefits department by today for enrollments/changes effective October 1. If you have any questions regarding the plan, contact your local Benefits administrator or corporate Benefits department in Westboro.

PAST Dates For Data General Scholarships Set

If you are a regular full-time Data General employee and have a child who will be graduating from high school in 1989, now is the time to consider applying for a Data General Scholarship. The scholarship program is a Data General benefit established for the children of Data General employees. It is administered by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation. Ten scholarships are awarded each year. The stipend of each scholarship ranges from \$500 to \$2,000 per year for up to four years, or until bachelor's degree requirements are completed, whichever comes first.

Students applying for a Data General scholarship must take the PSAT (Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude

Test) during their junior year in high school. This year the test will be administered in high schools throughout the country on October 17 or October 20. Interested students should contact their guidance counselors as soon as possible to register for the PSAT.

Keep in mind that application for a Data Gener scholarship must be made during the students JUNIOR year in high school. Therefore, even students who are currently undecided as to whether or not they want to attend college should be encouraged to take the PSAT in October.

Applications for the Data General Scholarship program are available from the Benefits and Human Resource departments. A letter will be sent to all applicants at the end of December to let them know their entry form was received.

Have You Filled Out Your New W-4 Or W-4A?

The Tax Reform Act of 1986 requires that a new W-4 or W-4A be submitted to employers no later than October 1, 1987. Failure to comply with the law can result in a higher Federal withholding. If a new W-4 or W-4A form is not submitted to a Data General Payroll site by October 1, the Payroll departments are required to alter employee exemptions according to the law. The law states that "if a new form W-4 or W-4A is no submitted, the employer must withhold if the employee is single, claiming one withholding allowance, or married claiming two withholding allowances, depending on whether the employee checked the single or married box on the most recent W-4 on file with the employer."

Employees can obtain W-4 and W-4A forms at the Payroll department. Should you need assistance filling out either form, the IRS, through its Taxpayer Service, can help answer your questions and provide you with additional information.

Educational Services is offering the following courses in September and October. Prior approval of your supervisor is required for course registration. Call (tie line) 221-1647 to enroll in these classes or other classes. All classes are held at the Education Center at 2400 Computer Drive in Westboro.

• DG/DBMS Utilization and Design (S316) - This course provides a working understanding of Data General's database management system. Schema and subschema generation, data manipulation language and DBMS facility used for recovery and concurrent controls are just a few of the topics to be discussed. Employees should have taken S209 (AOS and AOS/VS

User) to be eligible for this five-day class, which begins Monday, October 5.

- CEO System Operation (S222) Employees taking this course can learn the procedures for powering up the computer, as well as the operating system startup, utdown and backup. Use of selected command line interpreter commands (CLI) will also be discussed. This five-day course begins Monday, October 12.
- Introduction to Data General 32-Bit Computer Systems (H100/MV) This course presents the evolution of Data General's computer architecture from a 16-bit to the 32-bit design used in the ECLIPSE MV series. It explains the terminology of virtual storage systems and provides an overview of mass storage devices, terminals, printers and data communications. A knowledge of general computer design concepts, digital circuitry, and number conversions is needed for this ten-day class, which begins on Monday, October 12.

• 6026 Magnetic Tape Drive Field Maintenance (H223)

- This course teaches employees how to operate and maintain the 6026 series mag tape drive subsystems. Employees will learn how to load, run, and interpret the appropriate diagnostics, and how to use the alignment and adjustment procedures. The prerequisite of H100 or H100/MV (Data General 16-bit or 32-bit Computer Systems) is required to participate in this three-day course, which begins Wednesday, October 14.
- Introduction to MS-DOS (S145) Employees taking this course will learn how to use an MS-DOS-based personal computer. This two-day course teaches the atures and functions of the MS-DOS operating system: the hardware and software requirements, hard disk preparation, types and use of files, and more. There are no prerequisites, although some personal computer experience is preferred. The class begins on Monday, October 5.
- Using Advanced Features of MS-DOS to Manage Your System (\$146) This course teaches employees how to use the more advanced features and functions of the MS-DOS operating system. The prerequisite for this two-day course is \$145 (Introduction to MS-DOS) or experience with the MS-DOS operating system. This class begins on Monday, October 5.
