Savings And Investment Plan Deadline Is Today

Whether you are currently participating in the Savings and Investment Plan, or planning to enroll on April 1, you should be aware of the plan deadline. *Today, March 25* is the deadline for submitting all new enrollments and quarterly contribution changes to the Savings and Investment Plan. The enrollment forms (used for new enrollments, changes and fund transfers) must be returned to your local Benefits department by today for enrollments/changes effective April 1. If you have any questions regarding the plan, contact your local Benefits administrator or corporate Benefits department in Westboro.

Travel And Expense Policy Revised

Data General's North American Business Travel and Expense policy has been revised effective Monday, March 28. Copies of the policy are being printed and will be available in booklet form late next week at Travel and Expense offices. Copies will also be sent to each field office.

Highlights of the revised policy include:

- 1. A 22.5-cent per mile reimbursement rate for occasional drivers (non-car plan).
- 2. Increased daily advances of \$125 and \$175 based on area.
- 3. Increased daily meal maximums with a requirement that all required receipts be credit card or pre-printed restaurant receipts. Guest check stubs alone are not acceptable.
- 4. TAR and exception approvals are consistent at the regional director level in the field, plant manager, or ector level at other locations.
- 5. All hotel, travel and car rental reservations must be made through Corporate Travel. A corporate travel itinerary with the expense report is justification for all rates.

- 6. Reimbursements for hotels not booked through Corporate Travel or approved as an exception are limited to a maximum of \$50 or \$70 per day depending on area.
- 7. Miscellaneous items up to \$50 should be reimbursed through an Expense Report. Items for more than \$50 require a purchase order.

Copyright Notice To Users Of IRC

As many employees who use the Information Resource Center (IRC) already know, there are copyright laws which protect the rights of the software owner for the software and documentation that is available in the IRC. Making copies of the software or documentation would be a violation of these laws and, in the case of third-party software, possibly a breach of the agreements Data General has with the owners of such software and documentation.

As a result, it is strictly against IRC policy for any employees who use the of IRC to reproduce any software, documentation or any portion of that software or documentation. The IRC policy regarding software and documentation provides that:

Employees MAY:

- use any of the software loaded on the hard disk drives in the IRC;
- use any of the software and documentation available through the IRC;
- request to borrow software and documentation for home use pursuant to the IRC's Loaner System; and
 order your own copy of the software and documentation.

Employees MAY NOT:

- make copies of the software, documentation or any portion of that software or documentation without the express prior permission of an IRC staff member (note: permission is granted in very limited instances);
- distribute the software, documentation or any portion of it to others;

- install the software on machines other than those authorized by the IRC;
- alter, modify or adapt, in any way, the software or documentation; and
- authorize others to use or perform any other activity relating to the software, documentation or any portion of that software or documentation.

The IRC provides its resources and services as a convenience to all Data General employees. Any violation by an employee of the copyright laws or of Data General's obligations to third parties may jeopardize Data General's license agreements with third parties, subject you (or possibly Data General) to potential liability, and/or necessitate further restrictions on your use of the software and documentation available through the IRC.

CEO Travel Reservations Are Now Available

Employees within the Corporate Travel Services now can provide you with a trouble-free way to make business travel arrangements. Rather than pick up the telephone for your next travel reservation, send a request to the Corporate Travel Reservations office via CEO.

Corporate Travel Reservation employees check CEO business travel requests every 10 to 15 minutes and respond to urgent travel requests (for example, travel to take place within two days) in less than two hours. Less-urgent travel requests are answered within 24 hours.

The group has created a simple fill-in-the-blank CEO travel form that employees can file and copy each time they want to request travel services. To receive a CEO travel request form, send a message to **ADM Travel** at host system **IMG006**.

Please ensure your correct CEO mail address is indicated on your form request. CEO travel reservation requests can be mailed from any Data General location. CEO reservation services are available from 8:30 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. Eastern Standard Time.

Tuition Reimbursement Tax Reminder

Data General has begun withholding federal, state and FICA tax from Educational Assistance reimbursements determined to be taxable under the law. A Determination of Tax Status form is now required of all employees requesting initial approval for a course and those already enrolled at the time they request reimbursement.

Generally, courses are TAXABLE when required to meet the minimum requirements for the current job or

are part of a program that will qualify the individual for a new trade, profession or job.

Courses "required to meet the minimum requirements" would seldom apply to persons newly hired at Data General but may apply to current employed promoted into positions with a career plan to complete certain educational requirements.

A "program of study that will qualify for a new trade, profession or job" can be something very specific such as a program to become a lawyer or less specific such as a bachelor's degree in a particular field. Most bachelor degree programs qualify the individual for a new profession.

The reimbursement is **NON-TAXABLE** if the educational program or course is solely for the purpose of maintaining or improving skills of the individual required in his or her current job or in meeting the express requirements the company or law imposes as a condition to retain the individual's salary, status or job such as an engineering license or nursing certification.

Corporate Treasury Holds First Banking Meeting

- Business Analysis and Requirements Definition (BARD) BARD is a methodology to understand, document, communicate and analyze business requirements. BARD's primary goal is to improve communication between users and analysts. The result is an improvement in user involvement, satisfaction, and quality of solutions to business problems. This five-day course begins Monday, May 9.
