Area Code Change

On July 16, a third area code (508) will be introduced in Massachusetts. Most Data General employees working in Massachusetts reside within this service area.

According to New England Telephone, the addition of this area code is necessary to increase the supply of available phone numbers in the state. It will have no affect on current rates. Calls that are not currently toll calls will not become toll calls.

There will be no change in the present western Massachusetts service area (area code 413). The new boundary between area codes 508 and 617 runs in an approximate semicircle from Marblehead on the

North Shore around Boston to Kingston on the South Shore. Maps outlining the towns involved have been posted in Westboro, Southboro, Milford and Auburn for employee reference.

Data General facilities in Wellesley, Cambridge and Boston will remain in the 617 area code, however, there will be no change in the company tie lines to those offices.


Recreational Division
