Data General Wins \$3.6 Million Contract

Data General's subsidiary in the United Kingdom and Ireland has won an office automation contract with National Westminster Bank. Worth in excess of \$3.6 million, the contract calls for Data General to

provide office automation equipment to National Westminster's general management at their group headquarters. The order includes ECLIPSE MV/20000 superminicomputers, PCs and CEO office automation software.

In addition, Data General has signed a long-term agreement with Midland Bank, making it Data General's largest value-added reseller (VAR) in the United Kingdom. Midland, which is also the first bank to sign on as a Data General VAR in the United Kingdom, will market packaged business solutions based on Data General minicomputers to corporate clients.

Commenting on the Midland Bank joint marketing agreement, Diane Montagu, head of Midland Computer Services, says, "we view the agreement as a major new revenue stream for the group -- one which broadens and complements the scope of our computer services. We chose Data General after extensive evaluation because of their product range and their support capabilities."

Dave Lyons, vice president of European Operations, says, "the Midland agreement highlights our product strengths and epitomizes the philosophy behind our VAR channel. Our partnership with the Midland Group is key to our business strategy in the fianncial services market and we expect it to yield very significant returns."

Commenting on the National Westminster contract, Ray Fortune, senior vice president of Worldwide Sales, says "we won this order for two principal reasons: our ability to adhere to emerging international communications standards and because of the high level of functionality and PC integration we were able to achieve with our industry standard workstations. By taking different views of the Bank's technological and managerial requirements we were able to submit a better, integrated solution."

The contract calls for delivery of the system to National Westminster beginning in the second half of 1988.

NADGUG Conference Drawing Near

The 1988 North American Data General Users Group conference will be held from August 29 to September 1 at the Wyndham Franklin Plaza Hotel in Philadelphia.

The 15th annual conference is open to all users of Data General systems, including Value Added Resellers (VAR), Independent Software Vendors (ISV), end users and consultants. The four-day conference program includes management, technical and end-user sessions, roundtables, exhibits and informal meetings.

The keynote address by Dr. Nathan Goodman, senior vice president of Codd & Date International, will kick off the Conference '88 theme of communications and networking. Dr. Goodman is a well-known expert on relational and distributed database and transaction processing systems. Also included in the program are strategies, solutions, presentations, implementations and demonstrations on PC integration, information network services, distributed applications and industry standards.

Roundtables will provide an opportunity for users to ask questions about the development of major hardware and software products. Presentations by Data General employees and independent consultants will cover system usage in business, industry, academic and government installations.

In addition, the program will cover a wide variety of topics in other areas: CEO office automation, AOS/VS and AOS, ICOBOL, database management and 4GLs, and system management. Exhibits and handson demonstrations will feature the latest hardware, software and services from Data General and other exhibitors.

Facilities: On The Move

"Project Landlord," the code name given for the renovation of reasearch and development office areas in Westboro, has been underway for a little over six months in Buildings 14A and B in Westboro. With the dedication and hard work of the Data General Facilities staff, expectations are that the renovations will be completed in another 18 to 24 months.

In general, renovating a particular area takes six weeks. The facilities staff must tear down the existing area, rewire it as well as put in new ceilings, carpeting, walls, furniture and HVAC systems.

"At this time, we have nearly 28 percent of the project in place," reports Blair Wentworth, manager of Site Facilities. "The entire Facilities staff is working hard to make the renovations as undisturbing and

comfortable as possible. This includes building temporary space in order to support employees and programs while renovating their areas.

"Due to the number of new people joining Data General and the need for additional space, sometime it is necessary to relocate some departments or groups into 2400 Computer Drive and 3400 Computer Drive," says Blair. "We are trying to make the transition as smooth as possible and wish to take this opportunity to thank everyone involved for their understanding and coorporation."

In addition to coordinating the renovations, the Facilities staff also is responsible for the daily maintenance of the Westboro buildings. "We are really proud of the way our staff has come through," Blair says. "They are all working hard to maintain the buildings and equipment while keeping the renovations on track."

Partnership Strengthens With Bank Of America

Bank of America has been in the payroll service bureau business for 30 years and, for the last five years, it has been using Data General equipment to that end. The relationship between the two firms recently was strengthened when Bank of America purchased an additional \$1.6 million worth of Data General equipment.

Bank of America prepares payrolls for over 7,000 different companies. It has purchased nearly 30 ECLIPSE MV/Family computers to run its operations. Each month, Bank of America prints 2.5 million paychecks for its customers. For this reason, it recently has upgraded four ECLIPSE MV/10000 systems to ECLIPSE MV/20000 computers. This will allow for a quicker response time for its customers dialing in the Data General equipment to make payroll changes.

According to Ned Lawrence, a Data General Sales representative based in San Fransisco, Field Engineering played an important role in the latest sale. "A Field Engineering team headed up by Bill Bentley, vice president of North American Field Engineering, and employees from the Customer Support Center in Atlanta helped to demonstrate how the new Data General equipment would contribute to Bank of America. Bank of America was extremely pleased with the way Data General came in and supported its equipment."

Marie Rock To Represent Data General in Amsterdam

Marie Rock, a senior policy analyst within the Field Engineering Plans and Controls group, has been selected as a presenter at "Winning Strategies For The 1990s," the eighth annual Strategic Management Society Conference. The conference, scheduled to take place October 17 through 20, will be held in Amsterdam, the Netherlands.

Marie, who has been with Data General since 1986. was selected on the basis of an abstract she submitted to the Strategic Management Society's annual "Call For Papers." Within the next month, she will complete her paper that discusses how to use global electronic information networks to formulate and implement business policies in multi-national companies. In the paper, Marie uses Data General as a model for showing the benefits of using a global information network as a strategic support system. Marie will present her paper as member of the panel, the only United States representative on that panel. Other panels will cover corporate venturing, competitive market strategy, globalization and alliances, corporate culture, insurance and banking, strategic planning and European integration. Marie also is a contributor to strategic management textbooks for which she has written policy cases.

According to Marie's abstract, the rapid change in today's global economy requires a comparable responsiveness by multi-national corporations. Policies being developed to respond to strategic conditions often are negatively affected because they are not communicated in a globally-efficient manner. Marie points out that Data General uses a very efficient global information network to communicate with subsidiaries and country offices around the world.

"The implications for multi-national corporations are clear," Marie explains. "Efficient communications networking enhances responsiveness to economic and market conditions through the timely formulation, dissemination and implementation of those policies which have a global impact.

"The enhanced responsiveness may in turn provide he multi-national corporation with a substantial competitive advantage. Through the use of a network, such as the one developed by Data General, multinational corporations may establish a highly flexible strategic control system." The practical advantages of using an electronic information network, Marie says, include the elimination of delay time, the breakdown of communication barriers, the rapid achievement of consensus of opinion and the establishment of an information-sharing, global corporate culture.

The four-day conference will give participants a wide view on the topics of strategic management. Keynote speakers, state-of-the-art lectures, presentations on the "cutting edge research," panels and forums will give participants a variety of new ideas, thorough experience and inspiring visions on strategic decision making.

Akron Library Becomes Computerized

Editor's Note: The following story contains excerpts from an article by Peter Geiger which appeared in the Akron Beacon Journal.

The Akron-Summit County Public Library has inaugurated its long-awaited catalogue system with a helping hand from Data General. A Data General-based computerized catalogue system has been implemented at the Ohio library, affording users quicker-than-ever access to the books, periodicals and other materials at seven of the library's 18 branches throughout the city.

Previously, the library used a card catalogue as a reference guide. The computerized version now allows speedy checkout and return of books, records, videotapes and other library materials. To take advantage of the computerized systems, all the videocassettes and many of the books in Akron's main library have had bar-code labels affixed that allow computer teminals to read their titles.

The Akron-Summit County Public Library contracted with OhioNet, a non-profit corporation that provides bibliographic services for libraries. OhioNet is one of Data General's value-added resellers (VAR). Working with Data General, OhioNet wrote the software to drive the catalogue and circulation functions.

The catalogue system runs on an ECLIPSE MV/20000 computer in the main library's basement. The library also uses an ECLIPSE MV/4000 computer for administrative functions.

John Ryan, a marketing representative for Data General, recently organized a kick-off party to introduce the public to the new system. "We invited local residents and dignitaries," says John. "We have quite a few customers in that area. Before the kick-off event for the public, we held a private screening of the new system for other libraries in the area. We did get quite a bit of interest from that event. Four or five libraries have approached us about developing a similar system for their needs."

Dennis Mulvey, assistant director of the Akron-Summit County Public Library, also has been approached

by other libraries about the system. "We've discussed the advantages of our system with other libraries," Dennis says. "Now they are beginning to pursue acquiring their own system."
