## PSAT Dates For Data General Scholarships

If you work at least 30 regularly scheduled hours per week and have a child who will be graduating from high school in 1990, now is the time to consider applying for a Data General Scholarship. The scholarship program is a Data General benefit established for children of Data General employees and is administered by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation. Ten scholarships are awarded each year. The stipend of each scholarship ranges from \$500 to \$2,000 per year for up to four years, or until a bachelor's degree requirements are completed, whichever comes first

Students applying for a Data General scholarship must take the PSAT (Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test) during their junior year in high school. This year the test will be administered in high schools throughout the country on October 15 or October 18. Interested students should contact their guidance counselors as soon as possible to register for the PSAT.

Keep in mind that application for a Data General scholarship must be made during the student's JUN-IOR year in high school. Therefore, even students who are currently undecided as to whether or not they want to attend college should be encouraged to take the PSAT in October.

Applications for the Data General Scholarship program are available from the Benefits and Human Resources departments. A letter will be sent to all applicants at the end of December to let them know their entry form was received.

## NADGUG: Where Great Ideas Begin

For attendees of the 1988 North American Data General Users Group (NADGUG), Philadelphia certainly proved to be the place "Where Great Ideas Begin." More than 1200 people participated in Conference '88, making this year's event the largest ever NADGUG gathering. Presenters, exhibitors, independent software vendors (ISV) and value-added resellers (VAR) came from as far away as Canada, France, the United Kingdom, Holland, Belgium, Finland, Sweden and Australia to participate in the conference.

The conference's theme, Communications and Networking, was kicked off by Joe Forgione, director of Distributed Systems and Communications, who gave the communications strategy overview. The theme was carried throughout the sessions in topics such as network planning, designing, installation and management, PC access to information in a multi-vendor network and Data General's wide area intelligent network strategy. These sessions were reinforced by handson demonstrations in an exhibit area, where the Data General's Network Services division designed a network that tied together the entire Data General booth and 25 ISVs and VARs, as well.

Another conference highlight included an Executive Panel Discussion between the NADGUG Executive Advisory Board and Data General senior managers.


#### Dasher Road Races Have Arrived

The Dasher races will be held today. The foot races will begin at 5:30 p.m. at the usual starting line at the rear of Building 14A in the east corner of the north parking lot. All bicycle race entrants will gather at the old start at the back of Building 14A at 5:05 p.m. and ride as a group to the new start on Lyons Street.

#### Here Are The Race Routes

3-mile foot race: Start in the rear north parking lot and head off behind Buildings 14A and 14B, past the access road to 2400 Computer Drive, out the ma driveway onto Computer Drive. At the end of Computer Drive, turn left (staying outside the traffic island and always on the right side of the road) and cross the bridge over Rt 9. Run down the hill to the turn-around point - there will be a course marshall standing there to show you where to turn. Go back up the hill, turn right onto Computer Drive, run up Computer Drive and turn left into the main Data General entrance. Run straight back to the rear of Building 14A, and finish where the race began.





10K foot race: Follow the 3-mile route to the turnaround and turn around. Go back up the hill to the intersection at the end of Computer Drive (up until this point the course is identical to the 3-mile course).

t the intersection continue straight ahead bypassing the Jersey barrier on Lyons St. around the right end. Continue down Lyons St and turn right on Rt 30 at the end. Go east for 1-1/4 miles on Rt 30, then take a sharp right onto High St. Follow High St up over the hill and back down to Rt 30. Turn left and follow Rt 30 for 1/4 mile and turn left onto Brady St. Go 1/10 mile and bear right, and after another 1/10 mile turn left onto Hillcrest. Go UP the HILL and turn right on Crestview. Go 2/10 mile to the end of Crestview and turn left onto Lyons. Go past the Jersey barriers again and turn left on Computer Drive. Run the length of Computer Drive and turn left into the 4400 Computer Drive driveway. Continue straight to the finish line behind the building where you started.

11-mile bicycle race: The start will be at the intersection of Lyons Street and Rt 30, NOT at the back of Building 14A. From the start the route is the same as the old road course. Go east on Rt 30 3 miles to the traffic light at the intersection of Rt 85. Turn right and follow Rt 85 for 3 miles to Southville Rd. Turn right on "short cut" 100 yards before the traffic light at Southville Rd. Go west 4 miles on Southville/Flanders Rd. and up the hill over Rt 9 on the connector road. Turn right onto Computer Drive, go up the hill and turn left into the 4400 Computer Drive entrance. Ide to the regular finish line at the back of Building 14A.
